TWENTY –SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR C-28TH SEPTEMBER 2025

Approximately 700 plus years before the coming of Jesus the prophet Amos who we meet in our first reading from the Old Testament today was Preaching in the Northern Kingdom of Israel.

Amos fiercely castigated corruption and social injustice among Israel's pagan neighbours, Israel itself, and Judah; he asserted God's absolute sovereignty over man; and he predicted the imminent destruction of Israel and Judah.

Amos believed that God's absolute sovereignty over man compelled social justice for all men, rich and poor alike.

We move forward those 700 plus years to the time of todays gospel when we find Jesus using his favourite form of teaching, that is a parable which is a simple story used to illustrate a moral or spiritual lesson.

Where as Amos was full of brim and brimstone preaching, not wasting words on but coming straight to the point Jesus was more apt to make us want to think on a more personal level. Amos would reprimand all while Jesus would as us to think about our own lives.

Of course, the end result is still the same and we can find that in Paul's letter to timothy, our second reading today, where Paul says "you must aim to be saintly and religious, filled with faith and love, patient and gentle. Fight the good fight of faith and win for yourself eternal life". Jesus parable today introduces us to the very poor Lazurus and the very Rich man that owns the gates that Lazurus lays at. The parable tells us of Lazurus hungering for the scraps that are fed to the dogs from the rich mans table. They both then die and to the rich mans horror he ends up in constant torment in hell while Lazurus is taken into the bosom of Abraham on his way to eternal life in Heaven.

The parable tells us of the large gulf between the rich man and Lazurus and the inability of anyone to cross over it. The irony is that if the rich man had crossed that much smaller gulf that existed between him and Lazurus during their mortal lives on earth then they would both have had the opportunity to rest in the bosom of Abraham after their deaths. What did the Rich man have to do, he simply had to invite Lazurus to the feast. For it is not whether we are rich or poor it is what we do with what we have that counts. As Amos said that as people of God our aim should be social justice for all, rich and poor alike.








Spiritual formation opportunities

Lying on ivory beds and sprawling on their divans, they dine on lambs from the flock, and stall-fattened veal; they bawl to the sound of the harp, they invent new instruments of music like David, they drink wine by the bowlful, and use the finest oil for anointing themselves, but about the ruin of Joseph they do not care at all. But that is not all: between us and you a great gulf has been fixed, to stop anyone, if he wanted to, crossing from our side to yours, and to stop any crossing from your side to ours."

'The rich man replied, "Father, I beg you then to send Lazarus to my father's house, since I have five brothers, to give them warning, so that they do not come to this place of torment too." "They have Moses and the prophets," said Abraham "let them listen to them." "Ah no, father Abraham," said the rich man "but if someone comes to them from the dead, they will repent." Then Abraham said to him, "If they will not listen either to Moses or to the prophets, they will not be convinced even if someone should rise from the dead.""
