Finding True Treasure

What really makes a life worth living?

The book of **Ecclesiastes** is a good place to start. The author talks about how pointless it can feel to spend your whole life working hard to get rich, only to leave it all behind for someone else to enjoy, how empty a life focused only on things can be. All the stuff we work for, all our plans—they can seem meaningless when we get to the end of our life.

This ancient wisdom is perfectly illustrated in the story Jesus tells about the **rich fool** from the Gospel of Luke. A man asks Jesus to help with a family inheritance problem, but Jesus uses it as a chance to talk about something much more important. He tells a story about a man who has such a great harvest that he doesn't have room for it all. His first thought isn't to be grateful or to share; it's to build bigger barns. He says to himself, "I'll have so many good things stored up for years, I can just rest, eat, drink, and be merry!" The tragedy of the rich fool isn't that he was wealthy, but that he put his entire worth and identity in his possessions. He planned for a long future, but his life was taken from him that very night. He was rich in worldly goods but had nothing that mattered to God. Jesus ends with this powerful truth: "This is how it will be for anyone who stores up things for themselves but is not rich toward God."

So, what does it mean to be rich in what matters to God? The Apostle **Paul**, in his letter to the Colossians, gives us the answer. He tells us to look for "things that are above, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God." This doesn't mean we should ignore our daily duties. Instead, it's about changing our perspective. It means letting go of our old selves —the parts of us that are driven by greed and anger— and becoming a new person in Christ, created in God's image. Our possessions are not our goal in life but become tools to live out our faith and help others.

A perfect example of this is **St. Francis of Assisi**. Born to a wealthy merchant, he enjoyed a life of luxury and sought fame and glory. However, after a period of illness and a deep conversion, he heard a message from Christ to "rebuild my church." Taking this literally, he sold his father's goods to restore a dilapidated chapel. This act led to a dramatic break with his father, during which Francis publicly renounced his inheritance and all his worldly possessions. He embraced a life of total poverty and service. His example shows us what it means to be truly rich in what matters to God, using all of his energy and passion not for earthly gain, but for serving Christ and His people.







READINGS OF THE DAY EIGHTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR-C

First Reading

Ecclesiastes 1:2; 2:21-23

Vanity of vanities, the Preacher says. Vanity of vanities. All is vanity! For so it is that a man who has laboured wisely, skilfully and successfully must leave what is his own to someone who has not toiled for it at all. This, too, is vanity and great injustice; for what does he gain for all the toil and strain that he has undergone under the sun? What of all his laborious days, his cares of office, his restless nights? This, too, is vanity.

Responsorial Psalm

Ps 89:3-6. 12-14. 17. R. v.1

(R.) In every age, O Lord, you have been our refuge.

- 1. You turn men back into dust and say: 'Go back, sons of men.'
 To your eyes a thousand years are like yesterday, come and gone, no more than a watch in the night. (R.)
- 2. You sweep men away like a dream, like grass which springs up in the morning. In the morning it springs up and flowers: by evening it withers and fades. (R.)
- 3. Make us know the shortness of our life that we may gain wisdom of heart. Lord, relent! Is your anger for ever? Show pity to your servants. (R.)
- 4. In the morning, fill us with your love; we shall exult and rejoice all our days. Let the favour of the Lord be upon us: give success to the work of our hands. (R.)

Second Reading Colossians 3:1-5, 9-11

Since you have been brought back to true life with Christ, you must look for the things that are in heaven, where Christ is, sitting at God's right hand. Let your thoughts be on heavenly things, not on the things that are on the earth, because you have died, and now the life you have is hidden with Christ in God. But when Christ is revealed – and he is your life – you too will be revealed in all your glory with him.

That is why you must kill everything in you that belongs only to earthly life: fornication, impurity, guilty passion, evil desires and especially greed, which is the same thing as worshipping a false god; and never tell each other lies. You have stripped off your old behaviour with your old self, and you have put on a new self which will progress towards true knowledge the more it is renewed in the image of its creator; and in that image there is no room for distinction between Greek and Jew, between the circumcised or the uncircumcised, or between barbarian and Scythian, slave and free man. There is only Christ: he is everything and he is in everything.

Luke 12:13-21

A man in the crowd said to Jesus, 'Master, tell my brother to give me a share of our inheritance.' 'My friend,' he replied, 'who appointed me your judge, or the arbitrator of your claims?' Then he said to them, 'Watch, and be on your guard against avarice of any kind, for a man's life is not made secure by what he owns, even when he has more than he needs.' Then he told them a parable: 'There was once a rich man who, having had a good harvest from his land, thought to himself, "What am I to do? I have not enough room to store my crops." Then he said, "This is what I will do; I will pull down my barns and build bigger ones, and store all my grain and my goods in them, and I will say to my soul: My soul, you have plenty of good things laid by for many years to come; take things easy, eat, drink, have a good time." But God said to him, "Fool! This very night the demand will be made for your soul; and this hoard of yours, whose will it be then?" So it is when a man stores up treasure for himself in place of making himself rich in the sight of God.'
