Starting from this Month of May, in order to promote and encourage devotion and prayer, I have started the Praying of the **Angelus prayer** before the Friday afternoon, Saturday and Sunday Evening Masses. The Angelus is a pearl of our faith: it reminds us that the Word was made Flesh, that divinity humbled itself to embrace humanity, that the humble yes of Our Lady to God's invitation resounds throughout history. The prayer will be published in the Parish bulletin.

## Month of May - Rosary Devotion

Pope Francis has encourages the faithful to pray the Rosary during the month of May. The Pope says, "contemplating the face of Christ with the heart of Mary our Mother will make us even more united as a spiritual family and will help us overcome this time of trial".

### **How to Pray the Rosary**

1. On the crucifix (cross), make the sign of the cross and then pray the Apostles' Creed.

I believe in God, the Father Almighty, Creator of Heaven and earth; and in Jesus Christ, His only Son, Our Lord, Who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified; died, and was buried. He descended into Hell; on the third day He arose again from the dead; He ascended into Heaven, and is seated at the right hand of God, the Father Almighty; from there He will come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy Catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting. Amen.

### 2. On the next *large* bead, say the Our Father.

Our Father, Who art in heaven, hallowed be Thy name; Thy kingdom come; Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil, Amen.

# 3. On the following three small beads, pray three Hail Marvs.

Hail Mary, full of grace. The Lord is with thee. Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen.

### 4. On the chain, pray The Glory Be.

Glory be to the Father, to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit, as it was, is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Amen.

# 5. On the large bead, meditate on the first mystery and pray the Our Father.

You pray mysteries for each of the five sections (decades) of the rosary according to the day of the week:

### Mondays and Saturdays:

The Joyful Mysteries remind the faithful of Christ's birth: The Annunciation (Luke 1:26–38); The Visitation (Luke 1:39–56); We may imitate where The Finding of the Child Jesus in the Temple (Luke 2:41–52) they contain and obtain what they

### Tuesdays and Fridays:

The Sorrowful Mysteries recall Jesus' passion and death: The Agony of Jesus in the Garden (Matthew 26:36–56); The Scourging at the Pillar (Matthew 27:26); The Crowning with Thorns (Matthew 27:27–31); The Carrying of the Cross

(Matthew 27:32); The Crucifixion (Matthew 27:33–56). **Wednesdays and Sundays:** 

The Glorious Mysteries focus on the resurrection of Jesus and the glories of heaven: The Resurrection (John 20:1–29); The Ascension (Luke 24:36–53); The Descent of the Holy Spirit (Acts 2:1–41); The Assumption of Mary, the Mother of God, into heaven; The Coronation of Mary in heaven.

### Thursdays:

Pope John Paul II added The Mysteries of Light, also known as the Luminous Mysteries, in 2002: The Baptism in the River Jordan (Matthew 3:13–16); The Wedding Feast at Cana (John 2:1–11); The Preaching of the coming of the Kingdom of God (Mark 1:14–15); The Transfiguration (Matthew 17:1–8); The Institution of the Holy Eucharist (Matthew 26).

# 6. Skip the centerpiece medallion, and on the ten beads after that, pray a Hail Mary on each bead; on the chain, pray a Glory Be.


Although a decade is 10, these 12 prayers form a decade of the rosary. Many Catholics add the *Fatima Prayer* after the Glory Be and before the next Our Father: *O My Jesus, forgive us our sins, save us from the fires of hell and lead all souls to heaven, especially those in most need of Thy mercy. Amen.* 

# 7. Repeat Steps 5 and 6 four more times to finish the next four decades.

### 8. At the end of your Rosary, say the Hail Holy Queen.

Hail, Holy Queen, Mother of Mercy, hail our life, our sweetness, and our hope. To thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve, to thee do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this valley of tears. Turn then, most gracious advocate, thy eyes of mercy toward us; and after this our exile show unto us the blessed fruit of thy womb Jesus, O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary. Pray for us, O holy Mother of God. That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ. O God, whose only-begotten Son, by His life, death, and resurrection, has purchased for us the rewards of eternal life; grant we beseech Thee, that

meditating upon these mysteries of the most holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary, we may imitate what they contain and obtain what they promise. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.





### READINGS OF THE DAY - 5TH SUNDAY OF EASTER - YEAR C

### First Reading Acts 14:21-27

Paul and Barnabas went back through Lystra and Iconium to Antioch. They put fresh heart into the disciples, encouraging them to persevere in the faith. 'We all have to experience many hardships' they said 'before we enter the kingdom of God.' In each of these churches they appointed elders, and with prayer and fasting they commended them to the Lord in whom they had come to believe. They passed through Pisidia and reached Pamphylia. Then after proclaiming the word at Perga they went down to Attalia and from there sailed for Antioch, where they had originally been commended to the grace of God for the work they had now completed.

On their arrival they assembled the church and gave an account of all that God had done with them, and how he had opened the door of faith to the pagans.

### Responsorial Psalm Psalm: 144:8-13. R. cf. v.1

### (R.) I will praise your name for ever, my king and my God.

- 1. The Lord is kind and full of compassion, slow to anger, abounding in love. How good is the Lord to all, compassionate to all his creatures.
- 2. All your creatures shall thank you, O Lord, and your friends shall repeat their blessing. They shall speak of the glory of your reign and declare your might, O God, to make known to men your mighty deeds and the glorious splendour of your reign.
- 3. Yours is an everlasting kingdom; your rule lasts from age to age.

#### Second Reading Revelations 21:1-5

I, John, saw a new heaven and a new earth; the first heaven and the first earth had disappeared now, and there was no longer any sea. I saw the holy city, and the new Jerusalem, coming down from God out of heaven, as beautiful as a bride all dressed for her husband. Then I heard a loud voice call from the throne, 'You see this city? Here God lives among men. He will make his home among them; they shall be his people, and he will be their God; his name is God-with-them. He will wipe away all tears from their eyes; there will be no more death, and no more mourning or sadness. The world of the past has gone. Then the One sitting on the throne spoke: 'Now I am making the whole of creation new.'


### Gospel Acclamation

My little children, I shall not be with you much longer. I give you a new commandment: love one another; just as I have loved you, you also must love one another. By this love you have for one another, everyone will know that



### REFLECTION

During the season of Easter, we celebrate life. Life is expressed in love. The Gospel of John which we are reading, closely link these two themes. John presents Jesus saying goodbye to his disciples and leaving them a summary of his teachings. Though he will depart, yet he will continue to be among them if they continue to live according to the "new commandment" which he entrusted to them: "as I have loved you, you also should love one another" (13:34). This is new, not because it is the first time Jesus mentions it but rather because love is a permeant creation, a daily innovation, the ongoing search of ways to get out of ourselves and to made the other the centre of our life. This is the way to make Jesus present at all times. "by this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" (V. 35). Each one of us, the entire church must find ways to encourage people "to continue in the faith" (Acts 14:22) and to love others as Jesus loved us. To do that, we will have to let go of ourselves, our pettiness, our desire to be respected and appreciated in the world. The Son of God came to serve not to flaunt his prerogatives. People will not recognise the Lord if we do not love as he did, if we do not place all that we have and all that we are as Christians at the service of others. In this way, we will open "the door of faith" for those we meet and for ourselves. We must remember thus, to make Jesus' concrete love the model of our speech and our commitment before the challenges presented by the harsh reality of our world and society.
