TWENTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR C 17TH AUGUST 2025

Faith That Confronts and Transforms

The Gospel for the 20th Sunday in Ordinary Time (Luke 12:49–53) presents us with one of the most challenging statements of Jesus: "Do you think I have come to bring peace on earth? No, I tell you, but rather division." At first hearing, these words can unsettle us. Isn't Jesus the Prince of Peace? Didn't the angels announce peace at His birth?

To understand this, we must recognize that the peace Jesus brings is not a shallow comfort or a polite avoidance of conflict. It is the deep peace that comes from living in God's truth — and that often means confronting falsehood, injustice, and sin. The "division" Jesus speaks of is the inevitable tension that arises when the Gospel challenges entrenched attitudes, habits, or social structures. Following Christ is never a passive act; it requires courage to stand for what is right, even when it costs us relationships, comfort, or security.

The first reading (Jeremiah 38:4–6, 8–10) offers a powerful example. The prophet Jeremiah is thrown into a muddy cistern for speaking God's message, which was unwelcome to the powerful of his day. His fidelity to God placed him at odds with those who preferred denial to truth. Jeremiah's courage foreshadows the cost of discipleship that Jesus Himself

speaks of in the Gospel.

The second reading (Hebrews 12:1–4) reminds us that we are surrounded by a "cloud of witnesses" — the saints who have run the race before us. They inspire us to persevere in faith, "keeping our eyes fixed on Jesus," even when the journey is hard. The Christian life is compared to a long-distance race that requires endurance, discipline, and determination. This Sunday's readings challenge the popular notion that faith should always make life easier. Authentic discipleship can, in fact, stir up conflict. When we speak out against dishonesty, defend the dignity of the vulnerable, or refuse to compromise moral values, we may face opposition even from those closest to us. The "division" Jesus speaks of is not His desire for hostility, but the unavoidable reality that truth demands choices — and not everyone will choose the same path.

However, the purpose of this division is ultimately healing, not harm. Just as a surgeon must cut away what is diseased to save the body, Christ's truth exposes and removes what prevents us from living in God's love. True peace can only be built on justice, repentance, and reconciliation. For us today, this means asking: Where is God calling me to take a stand? Where do I avoid conflict at the expense of truth? Do I value Christ's approval above human approval? These questions are not comfortable, but they are necessary if we are to live as disciples in a world that often prefers shadows to light.

As we gather for the Eucharist this Sunday, may we draw strength from the One who endured the cross for our sake. Let us pray for the grace to speak and live the truth in love, to bear the cost of discipleship with courage, and to work for the kind of peace that only Christ can give — a peace rooted in justice, truth, and the transforming fire of God's love.





READINGS OF THE DAY TWENTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR-C

First Reading

Jeremiah 38:4-6. 8-10

The king's leading men spoke to the king. 'Let Jeremiah be put to death: he is unquestionably disheartening the remaining soldiers in the city, and all the people too, by talking like this. The fellow does not have the welfare of this people at heart so much as its ruin.' 'He is in your hands as you know,' King Zedekiah answered 'for the king is powerless against you.' So they took Jeremiah and threw him into the well of Prince Malchiah in the Court of the Guard, letting him down with ropes. There was no water in the well, only mud, and into the mud Jeremiah sank.

Ebed-melech came out from the palace and spoke to the king. 'My lord king,' he said, 'these men have done a wicked thing by treating the prophet Jeremiah like this: they have thrown him into the well where he will die.' At this the king gave Ebed-melech the Cushite the following order: 'Take three men with you from here and pull the prophet Jeremiah out of the well before he dies.'

not lose sight of Jesus, who leads us in our faith and brings it to perfection: for the sake of the joy which was still in the future, he endured the cross, disregarding the shamefulness of it, and from now on has taken his place at the right of God's throne. Think of the way he stood such opposition from sinners and then you will not give up for want of courage. In the fight against sin, you have not yet had to keep fighting to the point of death
