Sacred Heart Church, New Town Heritage Treasures

Sacred Heart Altar

The altar at Sacred Heart Church, New Town is designed by Henry Hunter and constructed by Bernard Molloy c.1881 and reconfigured c.1995 under the direction of the then Parish Priest Fr Geoffrey Jarrett.

The material used in construction of altar is Ross sandstone and painted faux marble column shafts and the style is Gothic.

The mensa (top of the altar) and base of the original altar which stood against the chancel east wall, but detached, shortened and brought forward closer to the west end of the chancel. The front face is supported by 4 cylindrical columns with foliated capitals, square abaci and moulded bases; the rear face supported on an arcade of cinquefoil -headed arches; moulded plinth.

In the reconfiguration of the original altar, the gradine segments were used to make a base support for the tabernacle, sited against the chancel east wall centre. The quality of both design and execution of this altar are outstanding. The altar was being carved by Bernard Molloy at around the same time as he was carving the Lady and Sacred Heart side altars for St Mary's Cathedral, these very significant works being the only two complete surviving stone altars by Henry Hunter, the protégé of Bishop Willson and Tasmanian's most prolific nineteenth-century architect.

Bernard Molloy was Irish born and a prominent member of the Hobart Catholic community and was among the signatories to the illuminated address of 23 February 1865 from the laity of Tasmania to Bishop Willson on the occasion of his departure for England. Soon after the launch of the Tasmanian Catholic Standard in 1867, Molloy was placing monthly advertisements for his services as a 'STONE and MARBLE MASON, Headstones, Tombs, Monuments, &c.'

REFLECTION - 15TH SUNDAY in ORDINARY TIME

We Need to Till the Soil of Our Hearts!

Today's Gospel contains the well-known parable of the sower. Jesus is teaching about the Word of God being spread like the seed that a farmer might broadcast over his field, but this is no ordinary farmer and the seed being sown is no ordinary seed. What is being sown is the word of God. As Isaiah points out in the first reading (Isaiah 55:10-11) God's word does not go out and return to Him empty. It always succeeds in what it is sent out to do. A word spoken by God created the universe. A word spoken by God brought you and me into existence. God's word is very fruitful and productive. It is like the rain that can make even the desert bloom and which is essential for all agriculture.

So too with the Word of God that Jesus is broadcasting. That Word can be extraordinarily fruitful in the lives of those who are prepared to humbly receive it into their hearts, ponder on it and act upon it. Humility is a key part of the process. The word 'humble' comes from a Latin root meaning soil (think 'humus'). Those in whose lives the Word of God thrives are those who have cultivated the desire to hear, know and love the Good News Jesus came to bring us – who want to understand and take in God's way of living.

It is clear from this parable though, that many people do not receive the word well. Some who don't understand it have the truth of it stolen from them by the Evil One. Some receive the Word with joy, but when trials come, they fall away. Some who receive the word and let it start to grow in their lives also lose it later, choked off by the worries of this world and the lure of riches. But note this very well: in the lives of those who are good soil, the Word of God produces an exceptional harvest – it is phenomenally fruitful.

So, dear brothers and sisters we should look to our hearts and see what sort of soil is there. Do we cultivate the soil of our hearts so that we can hear the Word of God and let it take root there? We have the choice to make. God respects our free will, but if we want to line up our lives with what Jesus is offering us, we need to spend time with the Word of God. Most especially we need to spend time every day, prayerfully thinking about the Word – using our minds and our hearts to hear and receive the Good News of Jesus. Saying the Rosary daily is a good start. Regular prayerful reading of the Scriptures is very effective, as is good spiritual reading (especially the lives and writings of the saints). That sort of meditation on the Good News is the key to cultivating the soil of our hearts so that we can grow in our lives of faith and be fruitful in all sorts of ways.



READINGS OF THE DAY - 15TH SUNDAY in ORDINARY TIME YEAR A

First Reading Iss

Isaiah 55:10-11

Thus says the Lord: 'As the rain and the snow come down from the heavens and do not return without watering the earth, making it yield and giving growth to provide seed for the sower and bread for the eating, so the word that goes from my mouth does not return to me empty, without carrying out my will and succeeding in what it was sent to do.'

Responsorial Psalm

(R.) The seed that falls on good ground will yield a fruitful harvest.

- You care for the earth, give it water, you fill it with riches.
 Your river in heaven brims over to provide its grain. (R.)

Second Reading Romans 8:18-23

I think that what we suffer in this life can never be compared to the glory, as yet unrevealed, which is waiting for us. The whole creation is eagerly waiting for God to reveal his sons. It was not for any fault on the part of creation that it was made unable to attain its purpose, it was made so by God; but creation still retains the hope of being freed, like us, from its slavery to decadence, to enjoy the same freedom and glory as the children of God. From the beginning till now the entire creation, as we know, has been groaning in one great act of giving birth; and not only creation, but all of us who possess the first-fruits of the Spirit, we too groan inwardly as we wait for our bodies to be set free.

Gospel Acclamation

The seed is the word of God, Christ is the sower; all who come to him will live for ever.

Gospel Matthew 13:1-23

Jesus left the house and sat by the lakeside, but such crowds gathered round him that he got into a boat and sat there. The people all stood on the beach, and he told them many things in parables. He said, 'Imagine a sower

going out to sow. As he sowed, some seeds fell on the edge of the path, and the birds came and ate them up. Others fell on patches of rock where they found little soil and sprang up straight away, because there was no depth of earth; but as soon as the sun came up they were scorched and, not having any roots, they withered away. Others fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Others fell on rich soil and produced their crop, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. Listen, anyone who has ears!'

Then the disciples went up to him and asked, 'Why do you talk to them in parables?' 'Because' he replied 'the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven are revealed to you, but they are not revealed to them. For anyone who has will be given more, and he will have more than enough; but from anyone who has not, even what he has will be taken away. The reason I talk to them in parables is that they look without seeing and listen without hearing or understanding. So in their case this prophecy of Isaiah is being fulfilled:

You will listen and listen again, but not understand, see and see again, but not perceive.

For the heart of this nation has grown coarse, their ears are dull of hearing, and they have shut their eyes, for fear they should see with their eyes, hear with their ears, understand with their heart, and be converted and be healed by me. 'But happy are your eyes because they see, your ears because they hear! I tell you solemnly, many prophets and holy men longed to see what you see, and never saw it; to hear what you hear, and never heard it. 'You, therefore, are to hear the parable of the sower. When anyone hears the word of the kingdom without understanding, the evil one comes and carries off what was sown in his heart: this is the man who received the seed on the edge of the path. The one who received it on patches of rock is the man who hears the word and welcomes it at once with joy. But he has no root in him, he does not last; let some trial come, or some persecution on account of the word, and he falls away at once. The one who received the seed in thorns is the man who hears the word, but the worries of this world and the lure of riches choke the word and so he produces nothing. And the one who received the seed in rich soil is the man who hears the word and understands it; he is the one who yields a harvest and produces now a hundredfold, now sixty, now thirty.
