Cathedral Heritage Treasures

'Auspice Maria' Seal

A brass inlay in the terrazzo finish floor of the forward sanctuary is a Marian symbol familiar to most Catholics consisting of two intertwined letters 'A' (Ave) and 'M' (Maria) surmounted by a crown and surrounded by a circle of twelve stars. The Book of Revelation describes a woman "clothed with the sun, and the moon under her feet, and upon her head a crown of twelve stars" (12:1, 2 & 5). In Catholic tradition that woman is the Blessed Virgin Mary, especially in connection with the Immaculate Conception. The symbol is called the Auspice Maria and is Latin for "Under the protection of Mary." Placed at the threshold to the sanctuary the revered monogram serves to remind us too that, as St. Louis de Montfort explained, it is through Mary that we come to her son, Jesus.

Bless these women, that they may be strengthened as Christian mothers and nurturers. Let the example of their faith and love shine forth. Grant that we, their sons and daughters, honour them always with a spirit of profound respect. We ask this in your holy name. Amen.

REFLECTION 6TH SUNDAY OF EASTER

Come Holy Spirit - Come!

In today's Gospel, Jesus reassures His disciples that although He will leave them, He will not leave them orphans. He will still be with them through the Holy Spirit sent to them by the Father. He describes the Holy Spirit as 'another advocate'. The third person of the Holy Trinity will be with them, even though the second person of the Holy Trinity will no longer be present with them in human form. In fact, when the Holy Spirit came down on them at Pentecost, He came to dwell in them. The Holy Spirit in them empowered this small band of frightened nobodies to take the Good News of Jesus to the whole world!

That is what we see in the first reading. Because of the persecution against Greek-speaking Christians which broke out after St Stephen's martyrdom, another deacon, Philip, fled to Samaria. Because he was 'full of the Spirit', Philip proclaimed the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the people of the town he went to. His preaching touched many hearts among people who welcomed the message of mercy and love that he brought. The Holy Spirit backed up Philip's inspired words by doing miracles of healing and deliverance among those Philip ministered to. That is what Jesus did on earth, and that is what the Holy Spirit does through faithful Christians who are prepared to share the Good News with others. Amazing things happen.

In our second reading, St Peter tells us that we must be like Philip – always ready to give a good answer to people who ask the reason for the hope we have in Jesus, Our Saviour. He admonishes us to always respond to such questioners with love – showing courtesy and respect. Our sharing of the Good News should always be an act of love.

And love is what we need in order to receive the Holy Spirit in the first place. Jesus says "If you love Me, you will keep my commandments" then the Father will send the Holy Spirit. What commandments? Love God with all your heart and love your neighbour as yourself. Loving God means committing our lives whole heartedly to what God asks of us. In this way, our lives will reflect His joy and His peace. Our neighbours will notice and ask us about our faith. Loving others means wanting the best for them. And the very best thing we could do for anyone is to share with them the Good News of Jesus, that God loves them and is dying to heal them and free them and to bring them home to Him. Come Holy Spirit fill the hearts of Your faithful ones and kindle in us the fire of Your love.




Our Parish Library is open for business and ready for books to be on loan to parishioners. There is a library Loan Register system to sign in/out for books.

READINGS OF THE DAY - 6TH SUNDAY OF EASTER YEAR A

First Reading Acts 8:5-8. 14-17

Philip went to a Samaritan town and proclaimed the Christ to them. The people united in welcoming the message Philip preached, either because they had heard of the miracles he worked or because they saw them for themselves. There were, for example, unclean spirits that came shrieking out of many who were possessed, and several paralytics and cripples were cured. As a result there was great rejoicing in that town. When the apostles in Jerusalem heard that Samaria had accepted the word of God, they sent Peter and John to them, and they went down there, and prayed for the Samaritans to receive the Holy Spirit, for as yet he had not come down on any of them: they had only been baptised in the name of the Lord Jesus. Then they laid hands on them, and they received the Holy Spirit.

Responsorial Psalm

Second Reading 1 Peter 3:15-18

Reverence the Lord Christ in your hearts, and always have your answer ready for people who ask you the reason for the hope that you all have. But give it with courtesy and respect and with a clear conscience, so that those who slander you when you are living a good life in Christ may be proved wrong in the accusations that they bring. And if it is the will of God that you should suffer, it is better to suffer for doing right than for doing wrong.

Why, Christ himself, innocent though he was, had died once for sins, died for the guilty, to lead us to God. In the body he was put to death, in the spirit he was raised to life.
