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THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER YEAR C - 4th MAY 2025

We find the apostles being questioned by the high priest. Now the the high priest would have been use to his word being treated as law and yet, even though the apostles were given a warning to not preach in the name of Jesus, and had been locked in the prison over night. They are found free and boldly preaching the next morning to the people. They are warned again not to preach in the name of Jesus and released, now the threats of the high priest and the Sanhedrin obviously didn't work since we have come to Mass today roughly 2000 years later, gathered in name of Jesus.

But are we as bold as the apostles were? Are we "glad to have had the honour of suffering humiliation for the sake of the name." Or do we lower our voices, wait till we are in accepting and like minded company before we use the name of Jesus?

We saw Peter deny Jesus on Good Friday, afraid to be associated with His name. Afraid of the consequences, a feeling we might relate to. But Peter's story didn't end there. In the Gospel today Peter is reminded of that thrice denial as Jesus asks him three times "Simon son of John, do you love me?" Peter's answer, of course, is "Yes lord, you know I love you." Jesus, after warning him of the suffering that was to come, invites Peter as he did the first time they met, "Follow me".

He invites us in the same way, and asks us the same question "Do you love me"? Naturally I would assume our answer would be the same as Peter "Lord, you know everything; you know I love you." But do we show it? If there was someone I love, more then anything this world could offer, more then life itself, would I not wish to call out their name whenever I had the chance, to find joy in hearing their name upon my lips.

There is a practice in the Catholic Church, when the name of Jesus is used to bow ones head, in reverence. In The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM), which provides guidelines for the celebration of Mass, we are told: "A bow of the head is made when the three Divine Persons are named together and at the names of Jesus, of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and of the Saint in whose honour Mass is being celebrated." We love our lord so much that we bow our heads when we hear his name. It isn't just in the mass though, beyond the liturgical setting, many Catholics have adopted this practice as a personal devotion whenever they hear or say the name of Jesus, as a constant reminder of His presence and power as well as an act of reparation for the times when the name of Jesus is used irreverently or in vain. Let us show our love for Jesus, let us never be afraid to use his name, and may we find Joy in hearing it upon our lips, and hearing others when they call upon him. As Peter says to the man outside the temple "I have neither silver nor gold, but I will give you what I have: in the name of Jesus Christ the Nazarene, walk!" May we preach the name, call upon the name and give of ourselves in the name of Jesus!

READINGS OF THE DAY – THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER YEAR C

First Reading

Acts of the Apostles 5:27-32. 40-41

The high priest demanded an explanation of the apostles. 'We gave you a formal warning,' he said 'not to preach in this name, and what have you done? You have filled Jerusalem with your teaching, and seem determined to fix the guilt of this man's death on us.' In reply Peter and the apostles said, 'Obedience to God comes before obedience to men; it was the God of our ancestors who raised up Jesus, but it was you who had him executed by hanging on a tree. By his own right hand God has now raised him up to be leader and saviour, to give repentance and forgiveness of sins through him to Israel. We are witnesses to all this, we and the Holy Spirit whom God has given to those who obey him.' They warned the apostles not to speak in the name of Jesus and released them. And so they left the presence of the Sanhedrin glad to have had the honour of suffering humiliation for the sake of the name.

Revelation 5:11-14

In my vision, I, John, heard the sound of an immense number of angels gathered round the throne and the animals and the elders; there were ten thousand times ten thousand of them and thousands upon thousands, shouting, 'The Lamb that was sacrificed is worthy to be given power, riches, wisdom, strength, honour, glory and blessing.' Then I heard all the living things in creation – everything that lives in the air, and on the ground, and under the ground, and in the sea, crying, 'To the One who is sitting on the throne and to the Lamb, be all praise, honour, glory and power, for ever and ever.' And the four animals said, 'Amen'; and the elders prostrated themselves to worship.

Gospel Acclamation

Gospel

<u>John 21:1-19</u>

Jesus showed himself again to the disciples. It was by the Sea of Tiberias, and it happened like this: Simon Peter, Thomas called the Twin, Nathanael from Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee

and two more of his disciples were together. Simon Peter said, 'I'm going fishing.' They replied, 'We'll come with you.' They went out and got into the boat but caught nothing that night.

It was light by now and there stood Jesus on the shore, though the disciples did not realise that it was Jesus. Jesus called out, 'Have you caught anything, friends?' And when they answered, 'No', he said, 'Throw the net out to starboard and you'll find something.' So they dropped the net, and there were so many fish that they could not haul it in. The disciple Jesus loved said to Peter, 'It is the Lord.' At these words 'It is the Lord', Simon Peter, who had practically nothing on, wrapped his cloak round him and jumped into the water. The other disciples came on in the boat, towing the net and the fish; they were only about a hundred yards from land.

As soon as they came ashore they saw that there was some bread there, and a charcoal fire with fish cooking on it. Jesus said, 'Bring some of the fish you have just caught.' Simon Peter went aboard and dragged the net to the shore, full of big fish, one hundred and fifty-three of them; and in spite of there being so many the net was not broken. Jesus said to them, 'Come and have breakfast.' None of the disciples was bold enough to ask, 'Who are you?'; they knew quite well it was the Lord. Jesus then stepped forward, took the bread and gave it to them, and the same with the fish. This was the third time that Jesus showed himself to the disciples after rising from the dead.

After the meal Jesus said to Simon Peter, 'Simon son of John, do you love me more than these others do?' He answered, 'Yes Lord, you know I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my lambs.' A second time he said to him, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' He replied, 'Yes, Lord, you know I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Look after my sheep.' Then he said to him a third time, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' Peter was upset that he

asked him the third time, 'Do you love me?' and said, 'Lord, you know everything; you know I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my sheep. 'I tell you most solemnly, when you were young you put on your own belt and walked where you liked; but when you grow old



you will stretch out your hands, and somebody else will put a belt round you and take you where you would rather not go.' In these words he indicated the kind of death by which Peter would give glory to God. After this he said, 'Follow me.'
