THIRTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR C-**26TH OCTOBER 2025**

Today we hear of the Tax Collector and the Pharisee going up to the temple to pray, not together but at the same time. We know through historical facts that tax collectors were considered the worst of the worst. Jewish men that collected taxes for the hated Romans. We also know that Pharisees looked upon themselves as above all others. To them they stood at the pinnacle of the Jewish society, fasting and praying, paying their way, being righteous in the eyes of the Law and God.

Society has not changed much over the years as there are always those amongst us who feel they are mor important than those around them. We are always complaining about the taxes we have to pay and also what our governments do with all our money. Society today is built around having differing levels of living standards.

We talk of the lower, middle and higher income levels as being a measure of your standard in society and then there is such terms as blue collar and white collar workers. Maybe we do not have Jewish tax collectors or pharisees that we can point our fingers at but there is always those that have more or earn more. Those that we condemn for living of the government benefits or those we accuse of stealing from the Government and the list can go on and on.

But!! We need to listen to our scriptures because our first reading today tells us the Lord is our Judge and to him our standing in society does not even count. Then Jesus in our Gospel talks to us of man's humility, that exalting oneself will gain nothing in the eyes of God.

It is not whether we are rich or poor. It is not our vocation in life. It is not how much we give or how hard we work. It is not which family we came from or how far up the ladder of success we have achieved. All these things in themselves are important parts of human society today yet it is how we present ourselves to God and to each other that becomes the yardstick of our lives.

The pharisee in todays gospel was not rejected because of who he was, he was rejected because he places himself above the tax collector. Do we do the same with those we meet along the course of our lives. When we are asked to love our God and to love each other do we do it with a sense of humbleness, of equality in the eyes of the Lord and say "God, be merciful to me, a sinner"



The tax collector stood some distance away, not daring even to raise his eyes to heaven; but he beat his breast and said, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner." This man, I tell you, went home again at rights with God; the other did not. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the man who humbles himself will be exalted.'
