What does it mean to Pray?

"The Function of Prayer is not to change God, but rather to change the nature of the one who prays." This is one of the most important aspects of our life of Prayer, as in a Preface of the Mass it is said "our praises add nothing to your greatness but profit us for salvation...". It is a means that helps us to gain holiness and fullness of life through the Lord. Thus we are called to be prayer warriors, power houses of unceasing prayer in every aspect of our life. This Sunday we will reflect on being a Person of prayer or as I would like to call it a Prayer warrior.

Who Is a Prayer Warrior?

IT is a person who chooses to fight personal and spiritual battles through prayer and the wisdom of the Lord instead of in their own strength.

What must you do to be a Man or Woman of Prayer (prayer warrior)

Study the Bible – to pray in agreement with God's words, we must first know His words. Studying the Bible is a key piece of that "Not my will but thy will be done."

Make time to listen to God – this is a piece of prayer that is often overlooked. As prayer warriors, we should become familiar with God's voice so that we can hear his instruction and follow his lead in all aspects of our life.


Be available for prayer – we can't be so busy with life that we put time with God to the wayside. We must make time for prayer.

Acknowledge who the real enemy is – prayer warriors recognize that most battles are spiritual battles first and that there is a real spiritual enemy behind them. (Ephesians 6:12)

Worship through hardships - worship keeps us humble, confessing what we believe, and battling in the strength of the Lord. It is a key component to prayer especially in the midst of pain and conflict. Speak life-giving words. "the tongue has the power of life and death." (Proverbs 18:21) The stakes are high. Your words can either speak life, or your words can speak death. Our tongue can build others up, or tear them down. It is said an unchecked fire doubles in size every minute. Rebuke or cast away life-stealing thoughts, words, and temptations. (2 Corinthians 10:5) Put on the "Armour of God" – these are the tools that keep us thinking, acting, and speaking in alignment with what is true even when that's not what we physically see. (Ephesians chapter 6)



First Reading Wisdom 7:7-11

I prayed, and understanding was given me; I entreated, and the spirit of Wisdom came to me. I esteemed her more than sceptres and thrones: compared with her, I held riches as nothing. I reckoned no priceless stone to be her peer, for compared with her, all gold is a pinch of sand, and beside her silver ranks as mud. I loved her more than health or beauty, preferred her to the light, since her radiance never sleeps. In her company all good things came to me, at her hands riches not to be numbered.

Happy the poor in spirit; the kingdom of heaven is theirs! Alleluia!


Gospel

Mark 10:17-30

Jesus was setting out on a journey when a man ran up, knelt before him and put this question to him, 'Good master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' Jesus said his heart. to him, 'Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone. You know the commandments: You must not kill; You must not commit adultery; You must not steal; You must not bring false witness; You must not defraud; Honour your father and mother.' And he said to him, 'Master, I have kept all these from my earliest days.' Jesus looked steadily at him and loved him, and he said, 'There is one thing you lack. Go and sell

everything you own and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me,' But his face fell at these words and

he went away



sad, for he was a man of great wealth.

Jesus looked round and said to his disciples, 'How hard it is for those who have riches to enter the kingdom of God!' The disciples were astounded by these words, but Jesus insisted, 'My children,' he said to them, 'how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! It is easier for a came! to pass through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God.' They were more astonished than ever. 'In that case' they said to one another, 'who can be saved?' Jesus gazed at them. 'For men' he said, 'it is impossible, but not for God: because everything is possible for God.'

Peter took this up. 'What about us?' he asked him. 'We have left everything and followed you.' Jesus said, 'I tell you solemnly, there is no one who has left house, brothers, sisters, father, children or land for my sake and for the sake of the gospel who will not be repaid a hundred times over, houses, brothers, sisters, mothers, children and land - not without persecutions - now in this present time and, in the world to come, eternal life.'

REFLECTION FOR THE WEEK

Complying or Living the Law

There are moments when we must answer the crucial questions about the core of our lives, the centre of our hearts, the thing we treasure the most. Two years ago, when the disastrous bush fires happened, people were fleeing their homes and running for safety. This unleashed the priorities of every human heart. Some people thought of things, money, and jewellery to save from the threatening disaster. But many also were those who thought of saving the lives of children and elderly parents or sick relatives. Heroes emerged when their hearts were ready and they decided to sacrifice their safety for saving the lives of others, without the law requiring them to do so. To live for them is to be ready to sacrifice.

The Gospel today illustrates a young man asking Jesus the question, "Good Master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" When Jesus confronted him and commanded him to "go and sell everything... and give it to the poor," it challenged the priorities in his life. The young man found it easy to follow the Lord by observing the laws he had received from his religious upbringing but his desire to give up material good was still far from

How easy is it for us to observe the law? To obey the law for the sake of complying, is far different than following and be ready to live the law. Similarly, the question challenges us, to transcend the law, to put the law at the centre of our hearts, but more importantly, to live the law in the core of our lives.
