The Dedication of the Lateran Basilica: The Living Temple of God

Each year, on **November 9**, the Church celebrates the **Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica in Rome**, the cathedral church of the Pope as Bishop of Rome. Though it may seem at first to be a local Roman feast, the celebration holds great significance for the entire universal Church. The Lateran Basilica, dedicated to Christ the Savior, is the *mother and head of all churches in the world*, reminding us of our unity in faith and communion with the See of Peter.

The Gospel for this feast, **John 2:13–22**, recounts the dramatic moment when Jesus cleanses the Temple in Jerusalem. Entering the holy place, He finds merchants selling animals and money changers conducting business. With prophetic zeal, He drives them out, overturns their tables, and declares, "Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a marketplace!" His words cut through complacency and corruption, calling for a return to the purity of worship and the reverence due to God's dwelling place.

This action of Jesus is not simply about external order or temple regulations; it is a sign that reveals a profound truth. When the religious leaders challenge Him, asking for a sign of His authority, Jesus answers, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." They misunderstand, thinking He refers to the physical temple building, but John clarifies: "He was speaking of the temple of His body." With these words, Jesus declares Himself the new and living Temple—the place where God and humanity meet perfectly. Through His death and resurrection, He replaces the old temple with His risen body, making a new way for us to encounter the divine presence.

The feast of the Lateran Basilica, therefore, points us beyond bricks and stone. It celebrates not only a historic building but the **spiritual reality of the Church as the Body of Christ**. Each time we gather in our parish church for the Eucharist, we enter the living temple of God's people. The physical church building is a visible sign of this sacred communion—a space where heaven touches earth, where sinners are reconciled, where faith is strengthened, and where God's Word is proclaimed and made flesh among us.

St. Paul reminds us that we, too, are temples of the Holy Spirit. By baptism, God's presence dwells within us. This means that every act of love, mercy, and forgiveness we offer becomes a form of worship that sanctifies the world. The cleansing of the temple challenges us personally: are there things within us that clutter our hearts and distract us from God? Just as Jesus purified the temple of Jerusalem, He desires to purify the inner temple of our souls so that we may become fitting dwelling places for His Spirit.

READINGS OF THE DAY THIRTY SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME—YEAR C

The Dedication of the Lateran Basilica: The Living Temple of God

First Reading

Ezekiel 47:1-2. 8-9. 12

The angel brought me to the entrance of the Temple, where a stream came out from under the Temple threshold and flowed eastwards, since the Temple faced east. The water flowed from under the right side of the Temple, south of the altar. He took me out by the north gate and led me right round outside as far as the outer east gate where the water flowed out on the right-hand side. The man went to the east holding his measuring line and measured off a thousand cubits; he then made me wade across the stream; the water reached my ankles. He measured off another thousand and made me wade across the stream again; the water reached my knees. He measured off another thousand and made me wade across again; the water reached my waist. He measured off another Gospel Acclamation thousand; it was now a river which I could not cross; the stream had swollen and was now deep water, a river impossible to cross. He then said, 'Do you see, son of man?' He took me further, then brought me back to the bank of the river. When I got back, there were many trees on each bank of the river. He said, 'This water flows east down to the Arabah and to the sea; and flowing into the sea it makes its waters wholesome. Wherever the river flows, all living creatures teeming in it will live. Fish will be very plentiful, for wherever the water goes it brings health, and life teems wherever the river flows. Along the river, on either bank, will grow every kind of fruit tree with leaves that never wither and fruit that never fails; they will bear new fruit every month, because this water comes from the sanctuary. And their fruit will be good to eat and the leaves medicinal.'

Responsorial Psalm Ps 45:2-3. 5-6. 8-9. R. v.5

R. The waters of the river gladden the city of God.

God is for us a refuge and strength, a helper close at hand, in time of distress: so we shall not fear though the earth should rock, though the mountains fall into the depths of the sea. (R.)

The waters of a river give joy to God's city, the holy place where the Most High dwells. God is within, it cannot be shaken; God will help it at the dawning of the day. (R.)

The Lord of hosts is with us: the God of Jacob is our stronghold. Come, consider the works of the Lord, the redoubtable deeds he has done on the earth. (R.)

Second Reading 1 Corinthians 3:9-11. 16-17

You are God's building. By the grace God gave me, I succeeded as an architect and laid the foundations, on which someone else is doing the building. Everyone doing the building must work carefully. For the foundation, nobody can lay any other than the one which has already been laid, that is Jesus Christ.

Hope is not deceptive, because the love of God has been poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit which has been given us. We were still helpless when at his appointed moment Christ died for sinful

men. It is not easy to die even for a good man - though of course for someone really worthy, a man might be prepared to die but what proves that God loves us is that Christ died for us while we were still sinners. Having died to make us righteous, is it likely that he would now fail to save us from God's anger? When we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son, we were still enemies; now that we have been reconciled, surely we may count on being saved by the life of his Son? Not merely because we have been reconciled but because we are filled with joyful trust in God, through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have already gained our reconciliation.

Alleluia, alleluia!

I have chosen and sanctified this house, says the Lord, that my name may remain in it for all time. Alleluia!

Gospel John2:13-22

Just before the Jewish Passover Jesus went up to Jerusalem, and in the Temple he found people selling cattle and sheep and pigeons, and the money changers sitting at their counters there. Making a whip out of some cord, he drove them all out of the Temple, cattle and sheep as well, scattered the money changers' coins, knocked their tables over and said to the pigeon-sellers, 'Take all this out of here and stop turning my Father's house into a market'. Then his disciples remembered the words of scripture: Zeal for your house will devour me. The Jews intervened and said, 'What sign can you show us to justify what you have done?' Jesus answered, 'Destroy this sanctuary, and in three days I will raise it up'. The Jews replied, 'It has taken forty-six years to build this

sanctuary: are you going to raise it up in three days?' But he was speaking of the sanctuary that was his body, and when Jesus rose from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they believed the scripture and the words he had said.
