B) Meditatio

Now we want to apply the use of our memory and understanding to understand what God is trying to say to us though this text. Rejoice in the fact that God right now has a special message He wants to communicate to you through this reading and meditation!

Be open to God; think and pray. Be bold enough to ask the Lord: "Lord God, exactly what is the message you want to communicate to my heart and life right now?" The Holy Spirit hears you and will respond!

C) Contemplatio

Now utilize another mental faculty that God has endowed imagination—maybe a very vivid imagination. However, for good or for evil.

For evil, as a married person, it could happen daydreaming about a past girlfriend, thereby committing adultery of the mind, leading to adultery of the heart. 

READINGS OF THE DAY - 5TH SUNDAY OF ORDINARY TIME - YEAR C

First Reading

Isaiah 6:1-8

In the year of King Uzziah's death I saw the Lord seated on a high throne; his train filled the sanctuary; above him stood seraphs, each one with six wings.

And they cried out to one another in this way, 'Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts.

His glory fills the whole earth.'

The foundations of the threshold shook with the voice of the one who cried out, and the Temple was filled with smoke. I said: 'What a wretched state I am in! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips and I live among a people of unclean lips, and my eyes have looked at the King, the Lord of hosts.'

Then one of the seraphs flew to me, holding in his hand a live coal which he had taken from the altar with a pair of tongs. With this he touched my mouth and said: 'See now, this has touched your lips, your sin is taken away, your iniquity is purged.' Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying: 'Whom shall I send? Who will be our messenger?' I answered, 'Here I am, send me.'

Second Reading

1 Corinthians 15:1-11

Brothers, I want to remind you of the gospel I preached to you, the gospel that you received and in which you are firmly established; because the gospel will save you only if you keep believing exactly what I preached to you – believing anything else will not lead to anything.

Well then, in the first place, I taught you what I had been taught myself, namely that Christ died for our sins, in accordance with the scriptures; that he was buried; and that he was raised to life on the third day, in accordance with the scriptures; that he appeared first to Cephas and secondly to the Twelve. Next he appeared to more than five hundred of the brothers at the same time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died; then he appeared to James, and then to all the apostles; and last of all he appeared to me too; it was as though I was born when no one expected it. I am the least of the apostles; in fact, since I persecuted the Church of God, I hardly deserve the name apostle; but by God's grace that is what I am, and the grace that he gave me has not been fruitless. On the contrary, I, or rather the grace

of God that is with me, have worked harder than any of the others; but what matters is that I preach what they reach, and this is what you all believed.

Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia, alleluia!

Come follow me, says the Lord, and I will make you fishers of my people. **Alleluia!**

Gospel Lk 5:1-11

Jesus was standing one day by the lake of Gennesaret, with the crowd pressing round him listening to the word of God, when he caught sight of two boats close to the bank. The fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats – it was Simon's – and asked him to put out a little from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. When he had finished speaking he said to Simon, 'Put out into deep water and pay out your nets for a catch.' 'Master,' Simon replied 'we worked hard all night long and caught nothing, but if you say so, I will pay out the nets.' And when they had done this they netted such a huge number of fish that their nets began to tear, so they signalled to their companions in the other boat to come and help them; when these came, they filled the two boats to sinking point. When Simon Peter saw this he fell at the knees of Jesus saying, 'Leave me Lord; I am a sinful man.' For he and all his companions were completely overcome by the catch they had made; so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were Simon's partners. But Jesus said to Simon, 'Do not be afraid; from now on it is men you will catch.' Then, bringing their boats back to land, they left everything and followed him.

REFLECTION FOR THE WEEK

GOD ALONE CAN SAVE US

The Church teaches that "Sin is an offense against reason, truth and right conscience; it is a failure in genuine love for God and neighbour caused by a perverse attachment to certain goods. It wounds the nature of man and injures human solidarity." CCC 1849.

In all the readings of today, there is a cry for help. The prophet Isaiah and the apostles Paul and Peter all confess their unworthiness before God. Isaiah confesses that he is 'a man of unclean lips, living among people of unclean lips', Paul says 'I am *the least* of the apostles since I persecuted the Church', and Peter cries out saying – 'Leave me, Lord; I am a sinful man.' What we find in these confessions is not lip service, rather a genuine cry for help. It is a true desire to turn away from sins in order to be used by God for his glory and the sanctification of souls.

No living being is perfect, *Psalm 143:2*, yet God works powerfully through those who acknowledge his power to save. God is more interested in saving not destroying. Let us seek him with humble hearts whenever we fall.
