


This final consecration to our Heavenly Father truly is the "greater" consecration, the one in which all others find their origin and end.

# READINGS OF THE DAY—24TH SUNDAY OF ORDINARY TIME

#### First Reading

Isaiah 50:5-9

The Lord has opened my ear. For my part, I made no resistance, neither did I turn away. I offered my back to those who struck me, my cheeks to those who tore at my beard; I did not cover my face against insult and spittle. The Lord comes to my help, so that I am untouched by the insults. So, too, I set my face like flint; I know I shall not be shamed. My vindicator is here at hand. Does anyone start proceedings against me? Then let us go to court together. Who thinks he has a case against me? Let him approach me. The Lord is coming to my help, who dare condemn me?

# Responsorial Psalm Psalm 114:1-6. 8-9 R. v.9

# (R.) I will walk in the presence of the Lord, in the land of the living.

- 1 I love the Lord for he has heard the cry of my appeal; for he turned his ear to me in the day when I called him.
- 2. They surrounded me, the snares of death, with anguish of the tomb; they caught me, sorrow and distress. I called on the Lord's name. O Lord my God, deliver me!
- 3. How gracious is the Lord, and just; our God has compassion. The Lord protects the simple hearts; I was helpless so he saved me.
- 4. He has kept my soul from death, my eyes from tears and my feet from stumbling. I will walk in the presence of the Lord in the land of the living.

#### Second Reading

James 2:14-18

Take the case, my brothers, of someone who has never done a single good act but claims that he has faith. Will that faith save him? If one of the brothers or one of the sisters is in need of clothes and has not enough food to live on, and one of you says to them, 'I wish you well; keep yourself warm and eat plenty,' without giving them these bare necessities of life, then what good is that? Faith is like that: if good works do not go with it, it is quite dead.

This is the way to talk to people of that kind: 'You say you have faith and I have good deeds; I will prove to you that I have faith by showing you my good deeds - now you prove to me that you have faith without any good deeds to show.'

#### Gospel

Mark 8:27-35

Jesus and his disciples left for the villages round Caesarea Philippi. On the way he put this question to his disciples, 'Who do people say I am?' And they told him. 'John the Baptist,' they said, 'others Elijah; others again, one of the prophets.' 'But you,' he asked, 'who do you say I am?' Peter spoke up and said to him, 'You are the Christ.' And he gave them strict orders not to tell anyone about him.

And he began to teach them that the Son of Man was destined to suffer grievously, to be rejected by the elders and the chief priests and the scribes, and to be put to death, and after three days to rise again; and he said all this quite openly. Then, taking him aside, Peter started to remonstrate with him. But, turning and seeing his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said to him, 'Get behind me, Satan! Because the way you think is not God's way but man's.'

He called the people and his disciples to him and said, 'If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me. For anyone who wants to save his life will lose it; but anyone who loses his life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it.

#### REFLECTION FOR THE WEEK

'BUT YOU, WHO DO YOU SAY I AM?' (MK. 8: 27-30) You may first ask the following question? 'Who is God? You will find the answer to this question in Exodus 2<sup>nd</sup> book O.T. Ch.3: v 13-15. 'This is my name for all time; by this name I shall be invoked for all generations. I AM WHO I AM, - passed present and eternal. Jesus Christ confirmed his union with the Father during his farewell discourse at the Last Supper. 'I am in the Father and the Father is in me.' I invite you to read from St. John's Gospel Ch. 14: v 1-13.

Each time I read and reflect on the life, actions, death and resurrection of Jesus in the sacred scriptures, I feel that Jesus is constantly reaching out to our inner most hearts and whole being to help us understand who he really is and the purpose of his life among us. Jesus asks each of us 'Who do YOU say I am? Can we the Mystical Body of Christ today identify ourselves with Jesus in our modern times? There are so many people throughout the world who have endless needs. We claim to have faith but how do we express and live this out in our daily lives. Today we are challenged in every way. Faith without good works is dead. Jesus rebuked Peter. 'Get behind me, Satan.' In other words, follow God's way and not man's way.
