TWENTY -FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR C-21ST SEPTEMBER 2025

The Gospel of Luke (16:1-13) offers the parable of the dishonest steward, a story that is often misunderstood and can seem at odds with Christian values. However, it's not a tale about praising dishonesty, but a profound lesson in prudence and using earthly resources for a heavenly purpose. The parable's central character, a manager caught wasting his master's possessions, acts decisively when faced with dismissal. He shrewdly reduces the debts of his master's debtors, not out of generosity, but to secure future favours. His master, upon learning of this, praises the steward not for his dishonesty, but for his cleverness and foresight. This is the key: Jesus is not commending the steward's immoral act, but his prudence in a crisis. The steward, uses worldly means to secure his future. Jesus then challenges us to be as shrewd, but for a different kind of future—an eternal one. He encourages us to use their worldly possessions to make friends for eternity, so that when these earthly resources fail, they may be welcomed into eternal dwellings. This parable urges us to be proactive and intentional with our wealth and resources. Instead of hoarding or wasting what we have, we're called to use it strategically to build God's kingdom and serve others, recognising that everything we have is ultimately a gift from God.

The first reading from Amos (8:4-7) provides a sharp contrast to the parable's lesson on prudence. Amos, a prophet who spoke out against social injustice, condemns those who exploit the poor and "fix the scales" to cheat their customers. He warns against the dangers of greed and the desire to "buy the poor for silver." This message serves as a powerful reminder that while we are called to be shrewd, we must never do so at the expense of others. Our prudence should be guided by justice and mercy, not by a desire for personal gain at all costs. Paul's first letter to Timothy (2:1-8) offers another layer to this reflection. He urges us to pray for all people, especially for leaders and those in authority. This prayer is for our ability to "lead a quiet and tranquil life in all devotion and dignity." This call to prayer for others broadens our perspective from individual stewardship to communal responsibility. It reminds us that our actions and prayers are interconnected, and that using our resources—be they time, talent, or treasure—for the good of the community is a part of our Christian duty. The "dishonest" steward's cleverness serves as an unsettling yet powerful mirror. It forces us to confront our own priorities and to consider if we are as proactive about our spiritual future as we are about our earthly security. Let us seek to be good stewards of all that has been given to us, so that when our earthly life comes to an end, we may be welcomed into the eternal dwellings promised by Christ.





READINGS OF THE DAY TWENTY-FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR C

First Reading

Amos 8:4-7

Listen to this, you who trample on the needy and try to suppress the poor people of the country, you who say, 'When will New Moon be over so that we can sell our corn. and sabbath, so that we can market our wheat? Then by lowering the bushel, raising the shekel, by swindling and tampering with the scales, we can buy up the poor for money, and the needy for a pair of sandals, and get a price even for the sweepings of the wheat.' The Lord swears it by the pride of Jacob, 'Never will I forget a single thing you have done.'

Responsorial Psalm

Second Reading 1 Timothy 2:1-8

My advice is that, first of all, there should be prayers offered for everyone - petitions, intercessions and thanksgiving - and especially for kings and others in authority, so that we may be able to live religious and reverent lives in peace and quiet. To do this is right, and will please God our saviour: he wants everyone to be saved and reach full knowledge of the truth. For there is only one God, and there is only one mediator between God and mankind, himself a man, Christ Jesus, who sacrificed himself as a ransom for them all. He is the evidence of this, sent at the appointed time, and I have been named a herald and apostle of it and - I am telling the truth and no lie - a teacher of the faith and the truth to the pagans.

In every place, then, I want the men to lift their hands up reverently in prayer, with no anger or argument.

Luke 16:1-13

Jesus said to his disciples: 'There was a rich man and he had a steward who was denounced to him for being wasteful with his property. He called for the man and said, "What is this I hear about you? Draw me up an account of your stewardship because you are not to be my steward any longer." Then the steward said to himself, "Now that my master is taking the stewardship from me, what am I to do? Dig? I am not strong enough. Go begging? I should be too ashamed. Ah, I know what I will do to make sure that when I am dismissed from office there will be some to welcome me into their homes." 'Then he called his master's debtors one by one. To the first he said, "How much do you owe my master?" "One hundred measures of oil," was the reply. The steward said, "Here, take your bond; sit down straight away and write fifty." To another he said, "And you, sir, how much do you owe?" "One hundred measures of wheat," was the reply. The steward said, "Here, take your bond and write eighty." 'The master praised the dishonest steward for his astuteness. For the children of this world are more astute in dealing with their own kind than are the children of light. 'And so I tell you this: use money, tainted as it is, to win you friends, and thus make sure that when it fails you, they will welcome you into the tents of eternity. The man who can be trusted in little things can be trusted in great; the man who is dishonest in little things will be dishonest in great. If then you cannot be trusted with money, that tainted thing, who will trust you with genuine riches? And if you cannot be trusted with what is not yours, who will give you what is your very own? 'No servant can be the slave of two masters: he will either hate the first and love the second, or treat the first with respect and the second with scorn. You cannot be the slave both of God and of money.'
