Our Lady of Fatima

Our Lady first appeared in Fatima, Portugal, on 13 May, 1917. She appeared to three little children: Lucia Dos Santos, who was 10, and her cousins Francisco and Jacinta Marto, aged nine and seven while they were tending to their sheep. She was dressed in white and surrounded by light.

From May through to October 1917, Our Lady appeared and spoke to the children on the 13th day of each month.

She asked the children, if they were willing to offer themselves to God and to endure all the suffering he would send them in reparation for sins and for the conversion of sinners. They answered "Yes" and Our Lady said "they would have to suffer much but that the grace of God would be their comfort." She also asked them to recite the rosary every day to obtain peace for the world and to end the war. She taught the children to say the prayer we now say at the end of each mystery of the rosary: "Oh my Jesus, forgive us our sins, save us from the fires of hell, and lead all souls to heaven, especially those in most need of your mercy."



On 13th October, Our Lady appeared for the last time and identified herself as "the Lady of the Rosary." On that day 70,000 people had turned out to witness the apparition in torrential rain. A ray of light came down from the sun, which had suddenly broken through the clouds as the rain stopped. The sun began to revolve, sending out rays of light of different colours that lit up the surroundings. Then it went back to its place for a short time before seeming to fall from the sky towards the people, who fell to their knees and begged God for mercy. The sun then returned to its normal place.

What is the central meaning of the message of Fatima?

Perhaps the most well-known utterance of the apparition of Our Lady at Fatima was her confident declaration that "My Immaculate Heart will triumph". Pope Benedict XVI interpreted this utterance as 'The Heart open to God, purified by contemplation of God, is stronger than guns and weapons of every kind. The fiat of Mary, the word of her heart, has changed the history of the world, because it brought the Saviour into the world—because, thanks to her Yes, God could become man in our world and remains so for all time. The Evil One has power in this world, as we see and experience continually; he has power because our freedom continually lets itself be led away from God. But since God himself took a human heart and has thus steered human freedom towards what is good, the freedom to choose evil no longer has the last word. From that time forth, the word that prevails is this: "In the world you will have tribulation, but take heart; I have overcome the world" (Jn 16:33). The message of Fatima invites us to trust in this promise.'

In this month of May, I would like to invite you to practise devotion to Mary as a family. We as a parish family would pray one decade of the Rosary after the daily Mass at 9am in the Sacred Heart Church, and on Saturdays at 7.30am the whole rosary before the morning Mass at 8am and invite you to be part of this devotion.

This pagan represents those who do not think and act like us, unbelievers, the immigrants and asylum seekers, the elderly and most vulnerable, people of different race, language and nation who are living in our society. Peter

on the hand represents all of us who believe in Christ; Catholics, Mass goers, Priests, Religious and lovers of the sacred Scriptures. Peter does not condemn/harass this man, instead he shows him the heart of the God who loves unconditionally, *Act 10: 34-35.* The second reading and Gospel both acknowledge that it is in giving this type of love that we can truly own the name – Christians.


