# TWENTY-FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR C 24TH AUGUST 2025

Christ Our King on the Cross

As we celebrate the Solemnity of Christ the King, our minds might picture a mighty monarch seated on a throne, adorned in gold and purple. The Gospel, however, gives us a far different image: Jesus crucified on a cross, stripped of his dignity and mocked with the title "King of the Jews." Those who stand by jeer and insult him. This image challenges our earthly notions of power and kingship. Jesus did not come to rule by force, to command armies, or to compel obedience. He came to reign through love and sacrifice.

Yet, amid the taunts and jeers, one person truly saw the truth of Christ's kingship. The repentant thief, sharing the same fate of crucifixion, recognised something that many others missed. He looked at the dying man next to him and saw a king. His words are a testament to his profound faith: "We are paying for what we did, but this man has done nothing wrong. Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen often reflected on the powerful witness of the repentant thief. He marvelled at this man's faith, noting that while many around the cross—including the other thief—demanded an earthly escape from their suffering, the good thief sought something far greater: a place in an unseen kingdom. Sheen pointed out the beautiful irony in this moment. The thief, who had spent his life stealing, made one last, perfect theft. He didn't steal a miracle; he stole Paradise.

The repentant thief's final act reveals the true nature of Christ's kingdom. It is a kingdom of mercy, forgiveness, and unconditional love. It is a kingdom where even in our final moments, we can turn to the King on the Cross and be welcomed. The good thief had nothing to offer but his own death and a humble plea, and in that act, he received the promise of salvation.

Our Gospel invites us to examine our own hearts. Do we seek an earthly king who will solve all our problems, or do we recognise Christ as a king who reigns through humility and love? Do we, like the repentant thief, turn to him in our weakness and ask him to remember us in his kingdom?

Let us come together as a community to support and celebrate this beautiful milestone in their spiritual lives.









First Reading

Isaiah 66:18-21

Gospel

Luke 13:22-30

The Lord says this: I am coming to gather the nations of every language. They shall come to witness my glory. I will give them a sign and send some of their survivors to the nations: to Tarshish, Put, Lud, Moshech, Rosh, Tubal, and Javan, to the distant islands that have never heard of me or seen my glory. They will proclaim my glory to the nations. As an offering to the Lord they will bring all your brothers, on horses, in chariots, in litters, on mules, on dromedaries, from all the nations to my holy mountain in Jerusalem, says the Lord, like Israelites bringing oblations in clean vessels to the Temple of the Lord. And of some of them I will make priests and Levites, says the Lord.

#### Second Reading

Hebrews 12:5-7, 11-13

Have you forgotten that encouraging text in which you are addressed as sons? My son, when the Lord corrects you, do not treat it lightly; but do not get discouraged when he reprimands you. For the Lord trains the ones that he loves and he punishes all those that he acknowledges as his sons. Suffering is part of your training; God is treating you as his sons. Has there ever been any son whose father did not train him? Of course, any punishment is most painful at the time, and far from pleasant; but later, in those on whom it has been used, it bears fruit in peace and goodness. So hold up your limp arms and steady your trembling knees and smooth out the path you tread; then the injured limb will not be wrenched, it will grow strong again.

#### Alleluia, alleluia!

I am the way, the truth, and the life, says the Lord; no one comes to the Father, except through me. **Alleluia!** 

Through towns and villages Jesus went teaching, making his way to Jerusalem. Someone said to him, 'Sir, will there be only a few saved?' He said to them, 'Try your best to enter by the narrow door, because, I tell you, many will try to enter and will not succeed.

'Once the master of the house has got up and locked the door, you may find yourself knocking on the door, saying, "Lord, open to us" but he will answer, "I do not know where you come from." Then you will find yourself saying, "We once ate and drank in your company; you taught in our streets" but he will reply, "I do not know where you come from. Away from me, all you wicked men!"

Then there will be weeping and grinding of teeth, when you see Abraham and Isaac and Jacob and all the prophets in the kingdom of God, and yourselves turned outside. And men from east and west, from north and south, will come to take their places at the feast in the kingdom of God.

'Yes, there are those now last who will be first, and those now first who will be last.'
