1ST SUNDAY OF LENT YEAR B - 18TH FEBRUARY 2024

Dear brothers and sisters, we are now in the season of Lent. Lent had its origin as a period of fasting and penance for Easter and later of pre-baptismal preparation for catechumens. The duration was prompted by Jesus' wilderness fast.

Lent lasts from Ash Wednesday through the Chrism Mass on Holy Thursday morning which the bishop celebrates with his priests and consecrates the Sacred Oils, used for Baptism, Confirmation, Anointing of the Sick, and Sacred Ordination. The Easter Season begins thus with the evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Maundy Thursday and concludes with Pentecost Sunday, the Solemnity of the Coming of the Holy Spirit.

In the earliest centuries, the duration of Lent varied from place to place – one day, two days, forty hours, etc. The catechumens were prepared for years.

Then it was extended to 6 weeks, prompted by Jesus' fast for 40 days in the wilderness. At the end of the 4th century, 'forty days' became universal in the Western Rite.

In the fixing of the duration of Lent, the number of Sundays of the 6 weeks was not counted, since every Sunday was reckoned to be a little Easter, devoid of fasting and penance. So the number came to be 36 penitential days (6x6=36).

Now how to make the number 40? The Western Church added 4 extra days, beginning with Ash Wednesday. Thus the number 40 was completed (6x6+4=40). That's how Lent begins on a Wednesday, unlike Advent and Easter which always begin on a Sunday.

The fixing of the number 40 has plenty of biblical precedents:

- i. After 40 days on the mountain, Moses was given the 10 Commandments.
- ii. After 40 years in the wilderness, Israel reached the Promised Land.
- iii. On arrival at Horeb Mountain after 40 days, Elijah had a deep personal experience of God.
- iv. After 40 days of prayer and fasting, Jesus entered into combat with Satan (Mark 1.13).
- v. The Risen Lord appeared to His wavering disciples for 40 days before His Ascension.

This period of 40 days or years was not an end in itself but a preliminary for some climactic event. For example, the reception of the Decalogue, the inheritance of the Promised Land, the victory over evil, and the Ascension. So is Lent heading towards its climax, Easter – began in ashes and ended in the Paschal Fire.

Today, we are into the first Sunday of Lent and we reflect on the three temptations of Christ. In times of testing, we have Jesus' active compassion: Because Jesus himself was tested through what he suffered, he can help those who are being tested. Think of the biggest temptations you face and overcome them with the compassionate help of the Lord

First Reading Genesis 9:8-15

I will recall the covenant between myself and you... the waters shall never again become a flood to destroy all flesh.

God spoke to Noah and his sons, 'See, I establish my Covenant with you, and with your descendants after you; also with every living creature to be found with you, birds, cattle and every wild beast with you: everything that came out of the ark, everything that lives on the earth. I establish my Covenant with you: no thing of flesh shall be swept away again by the waters of the flood. There shall be no flood to destroy the earth again.'

God said, 'Here is the sign of the Covenant I make between myself and you and every living creature with you for all generations: I set my bow in the clouds and it shall be a sign of the Covenant between me and the earth. When I gather the clouds over the earth and the bow appears in the clouds, I will recall the Covenant between myself and you and every living creature of every kind. And so the waters shall never again become a flood to destroy all things of flesh.'

Christ himself, innocent though he was, died once for sins, died for the guilty, to lead us to God. In the body he was put to death, in the spirit he was raised to life, and, in the spirit, he went to preach to the spirits in prison. Now it was long ago, when Noah was still building that ark which saved only a small group of eight people 'by water', and when God was still waiting patiently, that these spirits refused to believe. That water is a type of the baptism which saves you now, and which is not the washing off of physical dirt but a pledge made to God from a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, who has entered heaven and is at God's right hand, now that he has made the angels and Dominations and Powers his subjects.
