

Bear the Word of God like Blessed Virgin Mary, "Theotokos"

Teaching through parables is quite a Biblical Tradition and the word "parable" is taken from the Hebrew word "mashal" meaning an illustrative story taken from day to day common man's life that is supposed to be a puzzle and a riddle for people or even take them by surprise, and the primary object of the biblical parable is to tease out a spiritual truth about God, Christ or

one of the Kingdom values. These features in the definition of a parable are seen in the parable we hear today, the parable of the sower. For example, Jesus is saying that the sower went to sow seeds and some fell on the path, some on rocky ground, others among thorns and thistles, and finally some on fertile soil. Seemingly, Jesus is preaching to a crowd consisting of 95% of peasant farmers. They would have thought that this is strange for a farmer to be so sloppy, careless, and ragtag. But the nature of a parable is exactly to surprise the audience and to puzzle or riddle them. The facts in a parable need not be socially verifiable. The purpose of this exaggerated approach is to tease out something important, which is to bring out the truth about the Kingdom of God.

No one else knows Christ as God in the manner that the Blessed Virgin Mary did. Why? Because she was the "Theotokos", God-bearer. Mary bore Christ, the eternal Word of the Father in her heart like the fertile soil in the parable today before she physically bore him. So let's ask the question of how Mary kept the Word? Keeping the Word of God means that our heart opens, it is open to that Word just like the earth opens to receive the seed. The Word of God is a seed and is sown. And Jesus told us what happens with the seeds: some fall along the path, some on the rocky surface and some among the thorns. This Word is not kept; these hearts do not know how to receive it, but Mary knew how to re-



ceive it. Once she received it, she became the handmaid of the Word. She ponders over the words and events that happen in her life in the light of her trust and faith in God.

So like Mary let us follow this three-fold path in keeping the Word of God:

- 1. Receive: How often do I read Scriptures? Have I read the Bible at least once? Do I pray with the Scriptures, at least a psalm or a simple verse?
- 2. Pondering in the Heart: Do I see God's hand in every action and in every event in my life? Do I recognise the presence of God living in the other person, even in people in whom I think the presence of God can't dwell?
- 3. Putting the kept and pondered Word of God into action: Like Mary do I intercede for people who need Christ's help?
