#### **Good Shepherd Sunday**

Today is the World Day of Vocations. Pope Francis tells us: "There can be no greater joy than to risk one's life for the Lord! I would like to say this especially to you, the young. Do not be deaf to the Lord's call. If he calls you to follow this path, do not pull your oars into the boat, but trust him."

Let us pray for the young people in our community, and in our families and circle of friends. May our prayers help them to be open to the Lord's call to consecrated life or priesthood.

#### A prayer request:

You might know of a young person in the parish, in your family or an acquaintance whom you think would make a good priest or religious. Why not pray for them by name on a regular basis? Carry them with you 'spiritually' to Mass on Sunday and place them on the altar at the offertory. Sometimes the Lord uses us as his instruments to encourage vocations.



#### Fourth Sunday in Easter Reflection

One of the oldest paintings of Christ, in the Roman catacombs, represent Christ carrying the injured, straying sheep gently on his shoulders back to the sheepfold. This is an image that has always appealed to Christians. We have Christ as our shepherd, he tells us so himself in today's Gospel. He also tells us that he knows us, knows us by name and that we belong to him. As a child or as an adult it is always a joy to be known by name, it always makes us feel important and recognised. To be called by your name by a friend always gives you a warm feeling. Your uttered name touches something in you like nothing else.



Jesus says of himself that he knows us by name. In Hebrew scriptures we

are told how God has inscribed the name of his chosen people in the palm of his hand. In the image of the good shepherd Jesus reveals to us the personal love of God for each and every one of us.

As sheep of the fold, we are called to an intimate relationship with him, not a passing relationship with Jesus, it's a forever relationship. One we can never lose. He will never turn His back on His sheep. We belong to Him, and He belongs to us. Thus in turn are called to know and care for each other learning from the example of the Good Shepherd.

#### Tasmania marks 200 years of the Catholic Presence

The Church in Tasmania has celebrated the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the arrival of the state's first Catholic priest with a Mass at St Mary's Cathedral in Hobart.

The anniversary marks the bicentenary since Fr Philip Conolly, one of the first two officially-sanctioned priests to minister in Australia, disembarked in Tasmania. He had travelled aboard the *Prince Leopold* from Sydney and arrived in Hobart on April 14, 1821.

Fr Conolly had served as a priest for five years in Ireland before volunteering for the mission in Australia. Although he was based in Hobart, he travelled around the state celebrating the sacraments and ministering to the Catholic population. He died in 1839 after having served most of his priestly ministry in Tasmania as the island's sole priest.

The celebratory Mass at St Mary's Cathedral was held on Sunday, April 18, attended by the Catholic faithful as well as guests including the Governor of Tasmania, the Hon. Kate Warner AC.

In the homily, Archbishop Julian noted that the bulk of Fr Conolly's ministry was to the convict population.

One of his earliest duties was to minister to convicts who had been sentenced to death. This task would be repeated throughout his priestly ministry.

His ministry was not only to prisoners. He celebrated marriages, baptised infants and presided at funerals. He also played a role in the Catholic education in Tasmania.

"In 1823 he opened a school, the second Catholic school in Australia, across the road in Harrington Street," His Grace said.

The candlesticks and the crucifix on the altar for the Mass were those donated to Fr Conolly by an Irish benefactor.

A book written by Tasmanian historian Dr Nick Brodie to mark the anniversary *Philip Conolly: A Bicentennial History of Tasmania's First Catholic Priest*, was also launched at the Mass.

Assembly 1 will be held in an online, multi-modal format from October 2-10, 2021. Assembly 2 is scheduled to be held in Sydney on July 4-9, 2022.








#### St Mary's Cathedral Bookshop
