



Sacred Heart Church, New Town Heritage Treasures

Sacred Heart Church New Town, Tasmania Foundation Stone was laid on the 4th February 1878. The Nave and Porch was opened on 18th January 1880, with the Chancel and Sacristy opened on the 16th January 1882.

The Church is of a Gothic style, designed by local architect Henry Hunter, and some of the builders had experience working on St Mary's Cathedral, Hobart. At the time work started, it was a green-field site, purchased by the Church for £120, and served a semi-rural community.

In 1999 the Church Spire was built by Michael R Cooper and Associates.

Sacred Heart Church has long been connected with the School that now surrounds it. The foundation stone for the first dedicated building of Sacred Heart School laid in 1887. From 1908 the Sacred Heart Convent School at New Town was run by the Sisters of St Joseph.

REFLECTION 13TH SUNDAY in ORDINARY TIME

All For Jesus.

At the heart of today's Gospel passage, Jesus tells us that the only way to find life is in Him. Jesus has to be first in our lives. Our deepest love must be for Jesus Christ, who is our one true hope. If we are to attain the eternal and abundant life we were created for, we have to make our relationship with Jesus the most important one — the foundational relationship of our lives. God's love for us is freely given but requires of us a whole-hearted response.


Who or what takes first place in your life - in your daily thoughts, cares, and concerns? God has put us first in His thought, care, and concern for our well-being and future. God loved us first and our love for Him is the only possible response to His exceeding kindness and mercy towards us. Even while we were hopelessly adrift through our own sinful pride, rebellion, and unbelief, He chose to give us His own beloved Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ, who laid down His life for our sake - to set us free from slavery to sin, Satan and death.

Jesus is warning us that following Him will not be easy. To be His disciple is to take up the cross He gives us every day. He promises us that the burden of this yoke (of being bound to Him through the deepest bonds of love) will be bearable because He is carrying this burden with us. Indeed, He will do the 'heavy lifting' but we still have to do our bit (Matt 11:30). Often the burden of following Jesus is precisely that of loving those nearest to us – our parents, our children and our neighbours. But we must remember that in all these relationships of love, we have to love God above all.

In another place, Jesus told the lawyer that the greatest commandment was to "love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind" (Matt 22:37).

And loving God whole-heartedly will give us the grace to also love our neighbors as we love ourselves.

First Reading

2 Kings 4:8-11. 14-16

One day as Elisha was on his way to Shunem, a woman of rank who lived there pressed him to stay and eat there. After this he always broke his journey for a meal when he passed that way. She said to her husband, 'Look, I am sure the man who is constantly passing our way must be a holy man of God. Let us build him a small room on the roof, and put him a bed in it, and a table and chair and lamp; whenever he comes to us he can rest there.' One day when he came, he retired to the upper room and lay down. 'What can be done for her?' he asked. Gehazi (his servant) answered, 'Well, she has no son and her husband is old.' Elisha said, 'Call her.' The servant called her and she stood at the door. 'This time next year,' Elisha said 'you will hold a son in your arms.'

When we were baptised in Christ Jesus we were baptised in his death; in other words, when we were baptised we went into the tomb with him and joined him in death, so that as Christ was raised from the dead by the Father's glory, we too might live a new life. But we believe that having died with Christ we shall return to life with him: Christ, as we know, having been raised from the dead will never die again. Death has no power over him any more. When he died, he died, once for all, to sin, so his life now is life with God; and in that way, you too must consider yourselves to be dead to sin but alive for God in Christ Jesus.

Anyone who prefers son or daughter to me is not worthy of me. Anyone who does not take his cross and follow in my footsteps is not worthy of me. Anyone who finds his life will lose it; anyone who loses his life for my sake will find it.

'Anyone who welcomes you welcomes me; and those who welcome me welcome the one who sent me. 'Anyone who welcomes a prophet because he is a prophet will have a prophet's reward; and anyone who welcomes a holy man because he is a holy man will have a holy man's reward.

'If anyone gives so much as a cup of cold water to one of these little ones because he is a disciple, then I tell you solemnly, he will most certainly not lose his reward.'
