Information Evening for Cathedral/ Sacred Heart Parish Wed 23rd Oct 6-7pm 2nd Floor Cathedral Centre, Harrington St. All parishioners are most welcome to attend this evening and listen to Tassie Strafkos Manager, Governance, Risk & Compliance (GRC) Corporate Services, Archdiocese of Hobart outline the Safe Communities program initiated by the Archdiocese of Hobart to protect and safeguard children and vulnerable adults from abuse and neglect. This program follows on from the recommendations made by the recent Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse that recommended all parish and church communities be able to show its compliance with regard to safeguarding. Tassie will address the 10 elements that underpin the Safe Communities program and answer any questions regarding the Archdiocese requirement for all volunteers to have Police and Working with Vulnerable People checks. #### **HEART SPEAKS TO HEART**

The scripture reading for today speaks of justice, perseverance, faith and the invitation to pray constantly. Life in general is full of wonder and the mysterious abundance of the providence of God. We see this in the world around us and the variation of human life and all that surrounds us. All is gift. 'God is always the same but ever new.'

God chose Moses to be his spokesman, servant and prophet and entrusted him with leadership of his chosen race, the Israelites. The relationship between God and Moses was direct, strong, challenging and real. As the battle between the Amalekites and Israelites raged Moses was viewing it from the mountain top. Aaron and Hur supported the weakening raised arms of Moses until the battle was over. Joshua became a follower of Moses who after Moses' death at the age of 120 years became the leader of God's chosen people. Moses' perseverance in his relationship with God won for him the glory of Heaven.

God calls us continually into the mysterious encounter of love with him in every aspect of our human existence In the Gospel reading the unjust, proud judge seemed not to care about the widow and her need for justice in her life. The widow was persistent with her request pestering the judge for her just rights; all the judge wanted was peace for himself so he gave into her request.. Prayer is a gift which is initiated by God's presence. We can pray anywhere and at any time. God longs to converse with us and is always present to love and guide us in every aspect of our lives. It is through our knowledge of the Scriptures and the practise of our sacramental life among the community of believers that our faith matures and deepens. We are wonderfully called into life by God's providence and it is in prayerful union with him that we humbly present ourselves to God not knowing sometimes what to say. The best prayer is to say nothing for it is then that God prays in you. Heart speaks to heart. In union with Jesus Christ our relationship with God deepens and we want to share it with others not only through prayer but also through active service. When we invite God into our lives we can discover and know him to be our friend. St. Paul wrote; "The Spirit too comes to help us in our weakness, for when we cannot choose words in our effort to pray properly, the Spirit himself expresses our plea in a way that can never be put into words and God knows everything in our hearts." Final decision needs to be taken by the CPPC at a later date. Suggestion was made that it is important to keep information simple and accessible, possibly presented as a trifold brochure. Whatever the format and the content, the welcome pack/document has to be continually updated.
- Parish Secretary. Fr Shammi gave an update on the selection of process of the new secretary for the parish. Liz's farewell will be an informal private one, according to her wishes.
  - Guest contribution Safe Communities/Professional Standards
    Tassie Strafkos visited the meeting to discuss Safe Communities
    issues. A large packet of material was given to each member,
    which will be discussed in a workshop setting at a later date.
    Guidelines will be out by the end of the year. At the meeting, the
    discussion focussed on the non-negotiable nature of all the safe
    community requirements for the parish as a whole, and for all
    parishioners who have any interactions with others, especially if
    these are children or vulnerable adults. To have police checks and
    working with vulnerable people cards should become a matter of
    course for everyone. To keep our community safe is everybody's
    responsibility. "Children have to be kept in plain sight of the parents at all times" is one of the rules that we need to adhere to.

#### The Mystical Body by Fr Ron Rolheiser OMI (excerpt)

"I am done with great things and big plans, great institutions and big success. I am for those tiny, invisible loving human forces that work from individual to individual, creeping through the crannies of the world like so many rootlets, or like the capillary oozing of water, which, if given time, will rend the hardest monument of pride." This is wisdom from William James: The deep, important things that most affect us are usually not big and showy, but tiny, perhaps even imperceptible.

We see the truth of this just by looking at the human body. How little of it we see from the outside. Inside a human body are countless hidden, silent processes, all going on at once. Cells are growing and dividing, enzymes are fighting viruses, nerves are carrying messages to and fro, cancerous cells are being attacked by the immune system, even while the hair is greying, the body is digesting food, and is imperceptibly aging. Whether we are healthy or sick at a given moment depends largely on countless, silent, hidden processes.

Moreover, inside all this, there is an even more-complex web of hidden connections between these various processes. Everything is interconnected, no part does anything that doesn't affect everything else. This is true too of any social body. Every community or society has a certain visible life that can be seen and whose overt interconnections, to an extent, can be grasped, charted, and written up into textbooks. But, just as with the human body, most of the deep things in a community are under the surface, invisible, silent, available only through another kind of instrument, the intuitive gaze of the mystic, novelist, poet, or artist.

And all of this is even more true of the body of Christ, the community of the baptized, the sincere. Most of the important processes there are also invisible.

Like any other body, partly this body is visible – physical, historical, something that can be observed from the outside. Historical Christianity, the churches, in their concrete history, are the visible body of Christ – people, institutions, buildings, virtue and sin enfleshed in history. But the body of Christ is more than meets the physical eye, a billion times more. What's deepest inside of life is not visible to the naked eye.

Inside the body of Christ, we are present to each other and carry each other across the miles. Everything we do, good or bad, affects all the others. For this reason the church teaches that there is no such thing as a private act — of sin, virtue, or anything else. Nothing is private inside a body, everything affects everything. Moreover our union with each other links us, even beyond death. Inside the "communion of saints", we believe that our loved ones who have died are alive, still with us, and able to communicate with us and we with them.

To believe this is to be both consoled and challenged. Consoled, in

knowing that we carry each other in love and union, across all distance, even through death. But challenged too in knowing that everything we do, be it ever so private, is either a bad virus or an healthy enzyme affecting the overall health of the body of Christ and the family of humanity.

### Attention Extraordinary Ministers of Communion

Fr Shammi requests that all EMOCs should follow these guidelines as a refresher in carrying out this ministry effectively.

At the end of distribution, the special minister should reverently consume what consecrated wine remains in the chalice. Taking the purifier, this should be made into a pad, and the particles of the consecrated hosts remaining on the paten should be carefully brushed into the chalice. A small amount of water is then poured into the chalice, making sure that all particles are dissolved. The particles are then consumed. The chalice is then wiped out firmly inside the bowl, and around the rim. The purifier may then be placed in the chalice or folded lengthwise, and draped over the chalice.
