A few years ago, two famous deaths caught the world's attention—Diana, Princess of Wales, and Mother Teresa of Calcutta—two women separated by enormous differences of origin and lifestyle, yet linked by fame, friendship, and compassion. The compassion of the nun was poured out in a lifetime of serving the dying poor; the compassion of the princess, touching the untouchables. But both deaths help us reflect on what it means to live out the gift of life in the midst of people and possessions deriving from the one Creator. Both lives teach us what it means to be called by God to serve humanity.

Abraham was called from his home, Peter from his nets, Matthew from his office, Elisha from his farm, Nathanael from his retreat; we are all in the course of being called, on and on, from one thing to another. All through our life Christ is calling us. He called us first in baptism, but afterwards also; whether we respond to his voice or not, he graciously calls us still. It is he who calls us first, he who loves us first. We did not choose him, He chose us. He calls us again and again, in order to justify us again and again, and more and more, to sanctify and glorify us. When we consider the Biblical call narratives, there are five basic elements: (1) a situation of distress or crisis in which God confronts the person (Moses burning bush/slavery) (2) the commissioning of the person for some action or message (Deliverance from slavery) (3) objections raised by the person in the form of inadequacy for the task (I am a stammerer) (4) assurance of God's help, often in the formula "I will be with you" (I am the God of your ancestors) (5) a sign to confirm the



commission, often with the content of the commission (Turning the staff into a snake).

Mark alone mentions that "Jesus looked steadily at him and loved him." (Mk 10:21; cf. Mt 19:16-30 and Lk 18:18-30). "Love" in Mediterranean culture is appropriately translated as "attachment" in an active and practical way. It is a sign of ownership and of belonging to a person. If we really look back at our lives, we will notice at one point Jesus casting his loving gaze upon us, His eyes meeting ours. When he calls, he calls us for a reason that we may not understand. Sometimes we may not understand it for our entire lives. But on our part, our duty is to make sure nothing becomes a hindrance in responding to Him. In the case of the rich man, wealth brings power and, often, the delusion that one has no need for others, even for God. We are called to belong to His love, love that never fails but continually fills us with joy. That is why he made things simple for us and gave one magnificent commandment of love with two scintillating dimensions: Love of God and love of neighbour, which ultimately brings total meaning to our human existence. St Theresa of Avila puts it beautifully: "I give up all for All."



In Tímes Past ...

In January 1878 Tasmanian Catholics endured a paper schism. The story is a little opaque after a century and a half, but basically the December 1877 edition of The Tasmanian Catholic Standard was published as normal. It was No. 14 of Volume 1. In it, as usual, correspondents were advised that letters to the editor should be addressed to 122 Liverpool St, Hobart. At this address, as other information in the page makes clear, was Henry Shirley. He was the paper's editor.

Then, in January 1888 there were suddenly two papers. Both were No. 15 of Volume 2, both cost 6 pence per usual. Yet one was called The Tasmanian Catholic Standard, seemingly as normal, the other just The Catholic Standard. Little explanation for this was given in The Tasmanian Catholic Standard, although Henry Shirley was no longer a listed agent, and correspondents were advised to write to R. G. Fitzsimons, Proprietor, at 114 and 116 Liverpool St. In The Catholic Standard, however, was a long editorial explaining the 'most unexpected occurrence ... which has caused much enquiry among Catholics.' In short, the proprietor dumped the editor without notice or cause. Shirley only learned of the coup when the paper was printed, prompting him to rebrand as just The Catholic Standard.

Clearly some personality issues were at play. But rather curiously, the Bishop picked a side. In February, The Tasmanian Catholic Standard had a notice on its front page: 'From His Lordship Bishop Murphy:- "I hereby sanction the publication of "The Tasmanian Catholic Standard," the property of Mr. R. G. Fitzsimons, under conditions agreed to by him, and I recommend it as the only authorised Catholic Church organ in this Diocese. + D. MURPHY; Bishop of Hobart Town."


Not to be outdone, Shirley played a longer game. A year later, in February 1879, he sent a bound copy of The Catholic Standard to Rome. Through Monsignor Tripepi, he presented it to Pope Leo

story, the Pope then



expressed being 'much pleased with it, and sent his SPECIAL BLESSING to all who have a part in publishing it.' From April 1880 onwards that special blessing ran in a banner on The Catholic Standard's first page, in pride of place just under the title. It was placed above the spot where the rival paper's statement from Bishop Murphy usually went, a none-too-subtle game of ecclesiastical one-upmanship played in the Catholic papers of yester-year. For the record, the Pope's blessing eventually won out over the Bishop's sanction.

My employment roles have been teacher aide, disability support worker, manager of disability residential accommodation, service co-ordination, indigenous employment consultant in remote communities and disability co-ordinator.

I love swimming, bushwalking, gardening, listening to AB-BA/Bee Gees, watching Collingwood, car racing, musicals, concerts and movies. I enjoy being out on the open road and exploring. Travel has provided many awesome experiences and fantastic learning opportunities.
