

Basking in the euphoria of the glorious resurrection of our Saviour, the Mother Church invites us today into the bottomless and endless Pool of the Mercy of God, an abyss beyond our comprehension. The liturgical celebrations that come up after the re-enactment of the glorious resurrection of Christ give us the richness and the splendour of the liturgical life of the church. The great feast day of today, Divine Mercy Sunday, leaves us with immense insight into God's love for mankind. We are encouraged to turn our gaze to Christ, and to experience and value his reassuring presence.

In my deep thought on the essence of existence, I have come to understand that life, in order to be worth living, must include constant renewal and restoration. The high point of the Liturgy of the Word today reassures us of this very fact. The Bible tells us that the disciples of Jesus were behind a closed door because of the fear of the Jews. In his glorious body he appeared and stood amongst them. He breathed on them to transform them into a conduit and dispensers of mercy saying: 'Receive the Holy Spirit. For those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven; for those whose sins you retain, they are retained.' - (Jn 20:23).

That is simply a mandate for the effective and ongoing renewal, transformation and restoration in the Church. We can therefore say that devoid of the mercy of God, we are turned into earthenware and cannot be able to achieve any spiritual good. The story of the Prodigal Son is a good example – (Lk 15: 11-32). The moment he experienced the boundless and loving



mercy of his father his life was renewed and restored. A new page was turned in the son's life.

Jesus desires our total submission to his abyss of mercy. He patiently waits for our return. At the Tribunal of Mercy, the confessional room, he expects us to lay bare our sinful hearts to him and have the story of our life re-written. On this subject, Pope Francis in his Easter Message, 'Urbi et Orbi' in 2013 gave his timeless piece of advice saying: 'God's mercy can make even the driest land become a garden, can restore life to dry bones.'

Encountering Jesus will fill us with the desire to make a difference in the world. May we value and treasure more profoundly the mystery of divine mercy and transform our daily lives through works of mercy directed towards our neighbours.

Begetting Hobart...

A pair of baptisms on the same day in 1855 opens a small window into the under-documented world of single motherhood in colonial-era Hobart. The baptised were two girls, Ellen Ryan and Mary Cotter, neither of whom had their fathers recorded in the baptismal registers. Intriguingly,



their mothers were Mary Ryan and Ellen Cotter respectively. This rather suggests the women named their children after each other.

Curious after noticing this possible connection, I cast a wider net. This soon opened a series of such correspondences, a profoundly illuminating historical experience. Ellen Cotter, for instance, turned up for another fatherless baptism in 1857 as a sponsor for a girl named Ellen Regan. This Ellen's mother, Johanna Regan, acted as sponsor for the baptism of Lousia Maguire in 1855, yet another fatherless girl. Lousia's mother, Isabella Maguire, was sponsor in 1851 for the similarly fatherless Jane Mulchay. There was clearly a network of single women in Hobart, supporting each other and their children in the Faith. Attending the baptisms of their children, they literally stood by each other.

As already seen, some of these single mothers seem to have named their daughters for their friends. The names of the boys are less immediately clear. Randolph Foundling was baptised in 1855, for instance, but as his father was not recorded it is not evident for whom he may have been named. His surname was not a euphemism, even though it was perhaps pointed. Randolph's mother, Susan Foundling, acted as sponsor for two more fatherless baptisms in Hobart in 1855 and 1856. Randolph's own baptismal sponsor was another of these wellnetworked single women of Hobart. This was Mary Flanigan, a single mother herself to a child baptised in 1854. Mary sponsored two other fatherless baptisms, those for Michael Currie in 1854 and Eliza Reardon in 1855. The latter of these was named for her own mother, Eliza Reardon, who had an older daughter Johanna, baptised in 1853. Johanna Reardon's sponsor was Margaret Shanguessy, yet another single mother whose own child Ann was baptised only a few days before Johanna. Ann Sanguessy seems likely to have been named for her sponsor, Ann McGovern. The list could go on, like a series of fatherless biblical begetting, recording the transmission of the Faith at the fringes of society in old Hobart.


