

# What Is That in My Own Eye?

Dear Brothers and Sisters, Back in the late 90's when I was working for Telstra, that company implemented a process called "Vision 2000" aimed at making Telstra the very best telco. They formed workgroup forums where employees could discuss how to make their part of the organisation work better. Well it was not a great success. Instead of focusing on their own problems, most workgroups spent their energy on criticising others. The organisers should have known that was always going to happen. It is part of our human condition to be much more willing to criticise others than to face up to our own failings.

In today's Gospel (Luke 6:39-45), Jesus addresses exactly this problem: "Why do you observe the splinter in your brother's eye and never notice the plank in your own? How can you say to your brother '... let me take out the splinter in your eye' when you can't see the plank in your own?" We are never as aware of our own shortcomings as we are of others around us. And, moreover, if I do want to change someone for the better, the one I can have most influence on should be me!



If I am prepared to look honestly at my own shortcomings, then with God's help I can change something and so take the plank out of my own eye first. The great advantage of going this way is that I don't have to persuade someone else to change. The challenge, as Jesus points out to us, is that first I have to recognise that I actually have a problem. Still, that is easier if I listen to Jesus who assures me that if I do face up to my own sinfulness and ask for His help, He has the cure. Whenever I can repent, God's grace will be there to forgive me, free me and heal me. That is what Jesus does.

Next Wednesday is Ash Wednesday – the start of Lent. That is a great opportunity to look at our own lives, face up to our failings and ask Jesus to help us change.

# Great Evangelists Do Difficult Things - Marcel LeJeune (Pt 2)

What about you and me? How can we root out the ease and comfort and do something difficult so that we can grow? Here are some tips:

#### **Be Honest With Your Failures and Limitations**

God knows who you are and what your sins, wounds, weaknesses, and limitations are. So, be honest with yourself. Where are you weak? Where do you need to grow? Have you spent time in prayer asking God to show you the path to growth?

Growth should never just be about willing yourself into being better. It should involve discernment of how God wants you to grow and then an abandonment of our will to God's will. You do this through daily personal prayer and the frequent reception of the Sacraments. It is also done by moving forward once we know what God wants of us. Tell him, "yes, God, I will do what you ask of me." Then do it.

Here are some questions to get you thinking:

Do you find that your heart is more concerned with how you feel rather than the things you know are true and good?

Do you allow your emotions, desires, or passion to rule your decisions instead of discerning what God wants for your life and then following his will, wherever it leads?

Do you spend so much time on social media, Netflix, and/or games that you then don't have time to pray?

Do you seek out ways to be liked and loved or do you seek to love others, without concern as to what you get back from them?

Do you find that pride keeps you from seeking out help from others or do you allow yourself to sit at the feet of another (or others) to learn and grow from them?

Do you shy away from accountability from peers, because you are scared that it might mean you need to change or do you make time to pray and grow in community / accountability with others? Do you spend mental energy on learning about interests, hobbies, sports, music, etc & then have little interest in learning the Word of God and the teachings of the Church?

Do you concern yourself with building up a reputation and being accepted by others & then avoid sharing your faith, so as to avoid possible divisions? Do you love the praise of the world & then the praise of God is not enough?

Do you regularly seek opportunities to sin & few to repent?
Do you find your comfort is more important than the salvation of others? Do you spend enough time in prayer?
Do you need to exercise more?
Do you need to eat healthier?


