To be a committed missionary disciple of Jesus is quite a privilege, costly though, but not impossible. Today we hear again other 'hard words' of Jesus' sayings: 'Love your enemies...bless those who curse you, pray for those who treat you badly' (Lk 6:28). No doubt, this is a bit difficult, but with tolerance and humility, one could live it out and receive blessings in disguise.

It is guite hard to accept back into your life one who ruined your dreams, one who worked against you in many ways, got on your nerves and the like. Quite difficult indeed, but we can still go beyond ourselves to forgive. That is what Jesus is demanding from us today. It is not easy though, but through supernatural amazing grace, we can achieve a positive outcome.

Interestingly, we forgive not for the sake of other people, but for ourselves, so that we can move on with life. By doing so, we free ourselves from undue pain and strengthen our relationship with our God. As St Faustina said: 'He who knows how to forgive prepares for himself many graces from God. As often as I look upon the cross, so often will I forgive with all my heart.'

There is another strong point from the Lord in the gospel reading of today. He says: 'grant pardon, and you will be pardoned' (Lk 6:37). Simply put, if you forgive someone, you will be forgiven in turn. Your disposition towards others



influences people's reactions towards you. In Jesus' Prayer, the 'Our Father', we pray: 'Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us.' For us to be forgiven, we have to forgive others first, lest we invoke vengeance as we pray the Lord's prayer. Forgiveness is not a oneway street, but rather a two-way street. David, in the first reading, shows us a typical instance of forgiveness from the heart. King Saul was jealous of David, and in the company of thousands of his men, was in search of David to deal with him. The scene was turned the other way round. Lo and behold, David and his men found Saul and his troops asleep in the camp. Instead of pinning him to the ground with his own spear, David decided not to raise his hand against the Lord's anointed. He knew what it means to forgive from the heart. God himself forgave David when he asked for forgiveness after committing adultery with Uriah's wife (2 Sam 11; Ps 51). May the good Lord activate in us the

need to forgive and heal the wounds in

our relationships. *Fr Emmanuel Ibeke*


Dear parishioners, our annual Marriage Mass Renewal Of Vows will be celebrated by Archbishop Julian at 10.30am this Sun 24th Feb.



In Tímes Past ...

Long, long ago, in the days when fairies held sway, the wattle was not gold as it is to-day, but pure white.' So began a strange story for Children in the pages of the Archdiocesan Standard in February 1943. There was a night-time ball, to which 'the gnomes and pixies came in their best and brightest suits of gay autumn shades' in company with fairies wearing dresses made of 'flower petals, or soft spider web dyed in the colours of the rainbow.' It was all very odd, and not an especially Catholic story.

Rather, this was a type of Europeanised 'Dreamtime'-like story, of a sort familiar in the early twentieth century in Australia, and thankfully now out-of-fashion.

The story's main action centred not on the ball, but on the fact that the mosquitos were not invited. Incensed by this rather anti-social slight, they swarmed the joint and a battle ensued. The ball's invitees took refuge in the wattle tree and 'hard pellets' were soon flying out from its branches. 'The wise old wattle tree had told the gnomes and elves and pixies to make catapults from her twigs and short stems, and to use the wattle balls for their pellets.' The mosquitos were beaten off, and the Fairy Queen made the wattle's flowers turn gold in recompense for this good service.

Most likely the Second World War made it seem like a good time to tell a tale of battle and reward. But the messaging was mixed. The attack was precipitated by an act of exclusion from a decidedly elite event: not exactly a core Gospel theme. And while the flying insects and flinging nuts could perhaps have alluded to Japanese air raids and anti-aircraft fire, making the war intelligible to children, perhaps another insect should have been chosen by the author because the Mosquito was a contemporary British twin-engine combat aircraft and thereby an ally.

Margaret attended Campbell Street State School and Ogilvie High School and then worked as an Accounting machinist, and later worked for 17 years at the Bureau of Statistics, retiring at 60. John completed schooling at Sacred Heart and St Virgil's College and then enrolled as a Technician-in-training with the Post Master General's Dept. in 1951 and remained at PMG/Telecom/Telstra, retiring 40 years later in 1991. Margaret enjoys sewing, reading and x-words while John plays piano and organ, reads and does x-words. We were both very much involved in the parish when Immaculate Heart of Mary School was established in 1961. Myself as acolyte, and Margaret as special minister of communion, reader, sacristan and morning tea organiser. Margaret has been a member of the Calvary Hospital Auxiliary and we were Executive Directorate members of the Christian Family Movement, established by the late Archbishop Young; a movement where married couples met monthly for discussion and socialising. We were both inaugural members of the IHMS P & F Assoc. for the fledgling 2 room, 4 grade school. Fr. Allen was the last parish priest, retiring in 2000, so for the next 5 years, until the closure of the church, I was "ex-officio", looking after the parish. We are members of the Salesian Co-Operators Movement, a lay organisation established by St. Don Bosco, to assist and pray for Salesian priests and brothers. In the Civic area, we have been blood donors, Meals-on-Wheels deliverers, Sandy Bay Athletics Club members, where Margaret has been Secretary, Finishing Judge at meets and Wind Gauge operator. I was an Athletics Australia official, attaining the position of Chief Starter in Tasmania, retiring after 20 years. I was a volunteer reader at Radio Print Handicapped, and served on the organising committee during that tenure, retiring after 20 years.
