

GIVING WITHOUT COUNTING THE COST

Let us see what the Scriptures tell us about "GIVING WITHOUT COUNTING THE COST" today. Two widows, widow of Sidon and Prophet Elijah and the widow who put the last penny she had to live on to the temple treasury, all three of them demonstrate through their actions total dependence on and trust in Yahweh when it comes to giving.

Let's see the dire status of the widow in Israel: A widow was supposed to live for the rest of her life mourning and weeping for the loss of husband. A widow lived in poverty and in indebtedness and solely depended on the generosity of others for her day to day survival as she did not have a breadwinner in the family. Because of this she was permitted to glean in the fields and vineyards (that is to collect the left-over harvest). She was therefore very vulnerable, lived down the socio-economic ladder and listed among the poorest of the poor. It is such two vulnerable widows, with very little to claim as their own, who give to God everything they had. The Sidonian widow gave her flour and oil and the widow at the temple treasury her last penny to live for tomorrow. When they do that they completely throw themselves blindly on the bountiful and never failing providence of God. When they do that God blesses their cheerful generosity by giving them what they want in superabundance.

So it is fitting that as we prepare to commit to the renewal of the planned giving appeal, we take to heart the generosity

of God. When we give back what rightfully belongs to him, we need to give not grudgingly or under compulsion but counting without the cost, as the Scripture says: "For God loves a cheerful giver." (2Cor 9:7) How do you know "GIVING WITHOUT COUNTING THE COST" is genuine? Mother Theresa of Calcutta presents to us a litmus test. If a person is generous and giving without counting the cost such a person is cheerful and happy. For she says: "Cheerfulness is a sign of a generous person who forgetting all things, even himself or herself, tries to please God in all he or she does for souls. Cheerfulness is often a cloak which hides a life of sacrifice and a continual union with God."

Why do we need to give to God without counting the cost? The answer is found in common preface IV of the Mass: "For, although you have no need of our praise, yet our thanksgiving is itself your gift, since our praises add nothing to your greatness but profit us for salvation, through Christ our Lord".

So God doesn't want our praise, our love and our service. But everything we have belongs to God. Our talents, our house, our land, our children and everything that we own and have belong to him. It is our duty to show him that we love him unconditionally. One way of doing it is giving without counting the cost to the community that is the Church. Because the Church, as we believe, is the mystical Body of Christ and he is the head of that body. That is what God did in the event of the incarnation, giving his Son for us all without counting the cost.





In Times Past ...



Every time we enter St Mary's Cathedral from the Harrington Street door we are asked to pray for the repose of the souls of dead from the First World War. Mounted on the wall is a cross-shaped memorial, on which are the names of 48 men.

The three casualties of 1915 belong to Gallipoli. Percival Thomas Conlan, the first named soldier, was actually killed on 25 April 1915, the day of the landing. On his enlistment form he had written down "St Mary's Boys' school cadets" as evidence of prior military service. By trade he was a confectioner. Both James Edward Joseph Daly and Frederick Farrell died of wounds

they too received at Gallipoli. All three were single, aged between 19 and 24 years of age at the time of enlistment.

1916 saw Australian forces reach the Western Front, and the memorial bears this out. The seven casualties listed for that year hint at the creeping toll of European trench warfare which became all too common. Men died in July, then August, then September, then October, hinting at the active campaigns of autumn in advance of an approaching winter.

With 1917 came still more casualties as the war ground on. Aged from their late teens to late thirties, with a number of married men among them, that year's batch of 25 casualties impacted even more parts of the Tasmanian Catholic community. Labourers and clerks dominated, but there was also a sailor, an upholster, a baker, an electric lineman, a farmer, a carter, a fireman, and a pugilist. Their next-of-kin lived in Argyle and Campbell and Murray and Liverpool and Collins streets, as well as addresses in West and North Hobart, New Town, Trevallyn, Invermay, Derwent Park, Uxbridge, Hamilton, and Strahan.

A quarter of those killed in 1918 served in artillery units, highlighting the great slugging matches that characterised modern industrial warfare. The soldier on the memorial who died in 1919 shows that the war continued to have effects well beyond the armistice. The fighting stopped before the dying did.

The military records for these soldiers contain many poignant stories. For some, there are awards and gazetted notices of bravery. For all, there are records of pain. Whether sudden and dreadful deaths, or illness or wounds followed by hospitals and burials, their stories reveal many horrors of that "Great War". Most families corresponded with the authorities seeking information, clarification, medals, or a photograph of a grave. Too many had to seek proof of death so they could draw a pension.

Perhaps most touching of all are the personal effects which were returned to the families. Some items were reported "damaged", suggesting they might have been carried into battle. At least eleven sets of rosary beads were sent home to Tasmania, as were some twenty medallions, ornaments, pictures, or books described as "religious". Three of the soldiers had "prayer books", and there were six crucifixes among the collective effects. The families were often grateful for these tokens. While they represented a source of much sorrow, they also showed that the soldiers had carried their faith with them up to the end.

Faces of the Parish

Although Peter grew up on the North-West Coast of Tasmania, the Tierney con-

the North-West Coast of Tasmania, the Tierney connection with the Cathedral Parish goes back to approximately 1880 when Peter's great grandmother, Mary Caroll, in spite of her very young age and living at the other end of the State, ob-

tained the position of cook for the Archbishop. It was probably through Peter's great grandfather's interest in the Standard Newspaper that Michael Tierney met Mary Caroll. In approximately 1896 Mary persuaded her husband to move to the North-West Coast where they initially set up a farm at Mengha and then in 1898 a shop at Forest (just inland from Stanley). The shop was run by the family until Peter's father retired in 1988.

Peter's father and his wife Marjorie Bowden (who grew up in New Town and attended Sacred Heart School), had 8 children (four boys and four girls). Peter attended Saint Attracta's Convent (now St Peters Chanel) at Smithton and then secondary school at Marist College in Burnie as a boarder. After a gap year Peter attended the University of Tasmania and graduated from Law in 1973 and was admitted to the Bar in 1975 and has worked in the law in Hobart ever since except for short stints in London and Smithton.

Milley grew up in Bolivia, South America. Her grandparents (two Spanish grandfathers, a French grandmother and a German grandmother) moved to South America in approximately the 1920's. Milley's two brothers tragically died in separate accidents before she was born and after Milley there were born 3 sisters and 2 brothers. Milley attended Sacred Heart in La Paz. Her father was a lawyer. Milley worked as a secretary and for a short while as a TV news reader.

In 1976 Milley left Bolivia to tour around Europe with her uncle, aunt and cousin. When she arrived in London she was able to obtain employment and met Peter who had arrived in London for a working holiday. It took nearly 13 years to get back to Bolivia (delayed by marriage, moving to Australia and 3 children).

Milley's mother tongue is Spanish, she was fluent in Portuguese but is now somewhat rusty. Milley also speaks Italian and poor school grade French. Her career has involved raising 3 children and now helping look after 4 grandchildren (with 1 more on the way). Milley spent a short time working as a tourist guide and an aged carer. One of Milley's brothers remains living in Bolivia and Milley's mother and 3 sisters live in New York City and a brother lives in San Diego, California.

Peter and Milley mainly attend 8.30 am Mass at Sacred Heart Church (although if Milley has slept in, 10.30 am Mass at the Cathedral!). Peter is on the Parish Finance Committee. They both play the ukulele and have lived in New Town, Lenah Valley area for some 40 years and now hope to purchase another house in that area (God willing).
