'THE WORD WAS MADE FLESH AND DWELT AMONG US.'

Pope Pius IX proclaimed the Immaculate Conception in 1854 as follows: "The Blessed Virgin Mary was from the first moment of conception by a singular grace and privilege of the Almighty God and by virtue of the merits of Jesus Christ saviour of the human race was preserved immune from all stain of original sin.."

The Ascension of Jesus Christ into Heaven could only have taken place because of Mary's willingness in accepting God the Father's plan for her. Jesus the Son of God descended from Heaven and took human flesh from the virgin womb of Mary, After the fall of Adam and Eve God willed that the whole world should be saved from sin and destruction. The world stood still as if it was waiting for Mary's response. Her response made in deep trust to the Angel Gabrielle was, 'Behold the hand-maid of the Lord, be it done unto me as you have said.' In that moment Mary became the human instrument through which the mysteries of our faith began to unfold. These mysteries of our faith include the humanity and Divinity of Jesus Christ, the Trinity, the Kingdom of God, our redemption from sin and the promise of eternal life; the suffering, death and resurrection and ascension of Jesus the Son of God; the fact that we meet Jesus Christ in all the grace filled sacraments which are made available to us and by which God pours out his love abundantly upon us. This mystery of God's love for each person calls us to holiness. We are to be-

come saints through our union with God and in communion with the saints here on earth as in Heaven. Through his As-

cension into Heaven, Jesus is now united to his Father where he with Mary intercedes for us so that we might do our part in spreading the Good News of peace, joy, truth and justice. This is the pathway through which we are invited to follow Christ and so enter the realm of the Kingdom of God. Heaven is Mary's rightful home because by God's design the power of the Holy Spirit overshadowed her and Mary became the "Mother of God and the Mother of all the living.'. She is the Mediatrix of all graces. From the Cross on Calvary Jesus gave us the precious gift of Mary as Mother. "Mother, behold your son, son behold your Mother. Jesus also has given us for all time his real presence in the Eucharist for our consolation . We are not alone in our mission to 'go out to the whole world and spread the Good News'. This was Jesus' commission to his beloved disciples and to us as he returned to his heavenly Father. We are to be " stewards of the Word of God." Let us rejoice and be glad as we wait upon the promise of the Lord. Let the Holy Spirit fill our hearts so that we can find new ways to fulfil our call to discipleship. 'Come Holy Spirit'. 

In Times Past...

Church history, like the rest of history, is often oversimplified in hindsight. Historians contrast periods of stasis with moments of rupture to better understand continuity and change. The effect is often to exaggerate shifts, and com-



plex issues quickly get reduced to catchphrases. But history rarely works in a stop-start way. Wars, plagues, floods, and even Church Councils, all have their periods of cultural gestation and social digestion, and Hobart's Catholic story is no different.

Archbishop Simonds of Hobart neatly illustrated the seamless progression of Catholic history and thought in an address he gave to his priests in 1939, which was subsequently printed in The Australasia Catholic Record in 1940. In this talk, decades before the Second Vatican Council, he conveys a theology of the priesthood that is contested, not settled. He noted that 'we are confronted with two divergent views of the priesthood', essentially individualist and communal. He certainly favoured the latter, saying that 'opposed to the individualist view of the priestly office, there is an organic and a more dynamic conception of our office, which seems to me to be much more in harmony with the doctrine of Christ's Mystical Body'. Evidencing this, he offered some liturgical history: 'There once existed in the Church a venerable discipline by which the bishop and his clergy were accustomed to concelebrate the sacred mysteries at a common altar, each assisting according to the powers of his order.' In this historical allusion to the deep history of the Church, the Tasmanian Archbishop prefigured some of the 'changes' that eventually followed.

Understandably, given its context, Archbishop Simonds was interested in the Diocesan clergy. But while trying to promote a collegial view of the clergy, he also had to rebut what he - borrowing from a theologian - characterised as a tendency towards 'sacramental individualism'. He pointed out that: 'There are some who, I think, wish to place all the emphasis upon the sacrificial aspect of Christ's priestly office, and thus reduce the essence of the Christian priesthood to the powers of consecrating the Most Blessed Eucharist, and administering the other sacraments'. While recognising the importance of the sacramental life of the church, Archbishop Simonds saw this exclusive emphasis on sacramental functionalism as a diminished experience of priestly service focused on the Eucharistic ritual without the wider Eucharistic mystery; obsessed with atonement while neglecting pastoral service. He encouraged his priests to focus less on personal asceticism and more on apostolic charity. In some respects, he could be seen as well ahead of his time – except that he wasn't. He was, rather, a good proof of the complexities of his time. Dr Nick Brodie

Reminiscences from a parishioner about the history of Sacred Heart Parish, New Town.

I came to Sacred Heart in the early sixties. Our Parish priest was Dean Vincent Green. As we grew up, our boys were altar servers, together with the Zeitzens, Chisholms, Dooleys and many more. We were involved in the choir and as extraordinary ministers of communion and in many other pastoral ministries. As a parish, we had our family movement with Fr Peter Nicholls. We started the R.C.I.A. and the results were fantastic. Our parishioners were involved in Cursillo, a wonderful movement and through it we interacted with other Catholics all over Hobart, Richmond and in many other southern parishes. Due to pastoral reasons, when San Carlo Borromeo Church in North Hobart was deconsecrated, we welcomed some members of the Italian Community into our parish. We are grateful for their help and support.

We were an active parish: international dinners hosted by different nationalities in the parish; Sacred Heart celebrations with concerts; afternoons with oldies sometimes with the help from the school, were only some of them. Parishioners always filled the Parish Centre and we enjoyed all the activities. Similarly, due to pastoral reasons when it was decided that the Immaculate Heart parish be amalgamated with the Sacred Heart parish and the Immaculate Heart Church be deconsecrated, we welcomed those parishioners with great joy and are grateful for their contributions since then.

I am writing this because I am very proud of all that Sacred Heart Parish means to me.

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
