The Australian Catholic Bishops' Social Justice Statement for 2019 - 2020, 'Making it Real: Genuine human encounter in our digital world', affirms the positive possibilities for encounter and solidarity offered by new digital media, while warning of those elements of our digital world that may be harm-

ful. These include information overload: social isolation; marginalisation of the vulnerable; consumerism and fake news. The Statement reminds us that the new digital media cannot be seen as neutral or 'unaffected by any moral considerations'. While many users do not realise it, the core business of social media platforms is to sell advertising and maximise profits. People's personal lives may be reduced to data



that is traded for profit or power, and it is used to target and influence us in ways previously unthinkable. Pushing users to more extreme positions and promoting fake news and conspiracy theories sells, but this is at odds with human solidarity. The Statement points out that we are called not just to be inhabitants of this new digital world, but active citizens shaping it. All of us have a role to play in rejecting hatred, divisions and falsehoods. We have a duty to foster a neighbourhood that promotes those human attributes and social values that lend themselves to genuine human encounter - love, understanding, beauty, goodness, truth and trustworthiness, joy and hope. The Social Justice Statement will be launched at the 10:30 Mass this Sunday morning by the Archbishop.

In the gospel last Sunday concerning the parable of the crafty steward, we were reminded that we will be asked to make an accounting at the end of our lives where we will face the judgement seat of God. The crafty steward was praised not for his dishonesty but for his great initiative in preparing for what is to come. Our future is not a matter of ensuring a secure and comfortable retirement because we are meant for eternal life.

When we are absorbed in our comforts, pleasure and attachments, we become blind to the needs of others, even to the most obvious needs of the poor. If want to fulfil our call to love, we must be aware of this human weakness and overcome it by

putting into practice what we believe. The clear focus of today's readings can be summarized in the pointed questions directed to us in the Catechism of the Catholic Church: "How can we recognize Lazarus, the hungry beggar in the parable, in the multitude of human beings without bread, or a place to stay? "Truly I say to you that whatever you did to the least of my brothers, you did it to me."(Mt. 25:40)."(CCC 2463).



In the gospel, Jesus speaks about one selfish rich man and the poor Lazarus. The rich man, with his fine clothes and splendid feasts, lives exactly like the people Amos criticized. The rich man never notices Lazarus, though the poor man is lying at his gate. How could he miss a man in obvious need? Of course he saw him but he closed his heart. He refused to see him as a human being in need of food, care and love. He does nothing evil to Lazarus but he does nothing good to him either. The rich man is shocked to discover his situation reversed in the next life. If we want to avoid being shocked after death, we must repent of our complacency and open our hearts to others in this life. Fr. Norberto

Our Need to Share Our Riches with the Poor (excerpt) Fr Ron Rolheiser OMI

We know from experience that when we give of ourselves to others we experience a certain joy in our lives, just as when we selfishly hoard or protect what is ours we grow anxious and paranoid. Native American cultures have forever enshrined this in their concept of Potlatch, namely, their belief that, while everyone has a right to which Jesus warns us that it is private property, there are real limits to how much someone may own. Once our wealth reaches a certain point we need to begin to give some of it away - not because others need it but because our own health and happiness will begin to deteriorate if we hoard all of those possessions for ourselves.

Jewish spirituality shares the same idea: Again and again in the Jewish scriptures, we see that when a religious leader or prophet tells the Jewish community that thirsty? Cloth the naked? Finally, they are the chosen people, a nation specially blessed, that affirmation comes with the admonition that this blessing is not for them alone, but that, through them, all the nations of the earth might be blessed. In Jewish spirituality, blessing is always intended to flow through the person receiving it so as to enrich others. Hindu, Buddhist, and Islamic spiritualities, each in their own way, also affirm this, namely that it is only in giving away some of our gifts that we ourselves can



remain healthy. Jesus and the Gospels, of course, teach this repeatedly and without compromise: For instance, the Gospel of Luke, a Gospel within easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for a rich person to enter the Kingdom of Heaven, nevertheless praises the rich who are generous, condemning only the rich who are stingy. For Luke, generosity is the key to health and heaven. In the Gospel of Matthew, when Jesus reveals what will be a great test for the final judgment, his single set of criteria have entirely to do with how we gave to the poor: Did you feed the hungry? Give drink to the even more strongly, in the story of the widow who gives her last two pennies away, Jesus challenges us to not only give of our surplus to the poor, but to also give away some of what we need to live on. The Gospels, and the rest of the Christian scriptures, strongly challenge us to give to the poor - not because they need our charity, though they do, but because our giving to them is the only way we can stay healthy.
