With the Lord there is Mercy and Fullness of Redemption

Today's Gospel shows Jesus continuing His mission; calling the people to repent and telling them that the Kingdom of God is very near. He backs up His words by healing people and bringing freedom and peace to those oppressed or even possessed by evil spirits. He has chosen His twelve apostles and commissioned them to do the same – to bring healing, peace and freedom by the power of God's love and mercy.

Jesus, the Son of God came into the world as man, to fulfil God's promise to fallen humanity to raise up from within humanity a Saviour who would vanquish the power of the devil. And so, Jesus does not just talk about salvation – He actually saves and heals people, there and then. He frees them from the evil which has them trapped.

Of course Jesus' mission to save and heal is beset by difficulties. His fame had spread, and great crowds were coming to Him to hear Him and to be healed by Him. He and His disciples hardly had time to eat. Even His own extended family is trying to pull him out of the public eye convinced that He is out of His mind!

And then there are the scribes, who come from the religious establishment in Jerusalem, and are telling people that Jesus is in league with the devil! What they are most upset about is that Jesus has shown He has power over evil spirits. His power is a direct threat to the religious authority of the Temple in Jerusalem and His popularity is a real problem to the scribes and their ilk. The best attack they can come up with is to start saying that Jesus must Himself be possessed by Beelzebul (a name they used for the devil) and that He must be doing miracles through the power of the devil.

Jesus meets this attack head-on. He says to them "How can Satan cast out Satan?" The idea is ridiculous – that the forces of evil are fighting against each other, like a kingdom divided against itself which can never be effective. If Satan were fighting against Satan, it would be the end of him. No, Jesus says that He can tie up the evil one and take back what the devil had possessed because Jesus is stronger. Good is stronger than evil. The Kingdom of God is overcoming the kingdom of Satan.

And who comprises this Kingdom of God? It is not those born into a certain family or even a certain religion. It is anyone who does the will of God. Those who turn to Jesus and ask for His mercy are freed from sin and darkness. Those who listen to God and obey His instructions become not just part of His Kingdom but part of His very family and they even share the glory of His royal household.





The Archbishop's message regarding 2020 Plenary:

In preparation for the Plenary Council 2020, it has been proposed that the period from Pentecost 2018 to Pentecost 2019 be a time of "listening". The notion of listening is one promoted by Pope Francis. For example, in preparation for the upcoming Synod on young people the Pope has said, "We must listen to young people." It has been recommended that each diocese institute a Plenary Working Group to assist in the preparation for the Plenary Council, the major focus of which will be to advise the bishop on how to conduct this 'listening' process. The members of the working group will be announced shortly, followed by an announcement about the listening process. The question posed to all members of the Church in preparation for the Plenary Council is: "What do you think God is asking of us in Australia at this time?" In preparation for this phase, it is important that we clarify the nature of this listening process. Firstly, the idea of listening is understood as a listening to the Holy Spirit. Thus our focus is on what God is saying to the Church at this particular time? (Rev 2:7) Our starting point therefore needs to be prayer. I encourage all in the Archdiocese to place the future of the Church here in Tasmania and throughout Australia before the Lord and ask for God's merciful guidance.

The Pope recommends that one of the important ways in which we can listen to the Spirit is by listening to one another. Hence, the listening phase will involve Catholics across the Archdiocese coming together to listen to one another in a desire to know the prompting of the Spirit in our midst.

The Struggle to Love Our Neighbour by Fr Ron Rolheiser OMI

We don't turn the other cheek. We don't really love our enemies. We don't wish good to those who wish us harm. We don't bless those who curse us. And we don't genuinely forgive those who murder our loved ones. We are decent, good-hearted persons, but persons whose heaven is still too-predicated on needing an emotional vindication in the face of anyone or anything that opposes us. We can be fair, we can be just, but we don't yet love the way Jesus asked us to, that

is, so that our love goes out to both those who love us and to those who hate us. We still struggle, mightily, mostly unsuccessfully, to wish our ene-

mies well. But for most of us who like to believe ourselves mature, that battle remains hidden, mostly from ourselves. We tend to feel that we are loving and forgiving because, essentially, we are well-intentioned, sincere, and able to believe and say all the right things; but there's another part of us that isn't nearly so noble.

The Irish Jesuit, Michael Paul Gallagher, put this well when he wrote (In Extra Time): "You probably don't hate anyone, but you can be paralyzed by daily negatives. Mini -prejudices and knee-jerk judgements can produce a mood of undeclared war. Across barbed wire fences, invisible bullets fly." Loving the other as oneself, he submits, is for most of us an impossible uphill climb.

So where does that leave us? Serving out a life-sentence of mediocrity and hypocrisy? Professing to loving our enemies but not doing it? How can we profess to be Christians when, if we are honest, we have admitted that we are not measuring up to the litmus-test of Christian discipleship, namely, loving and forgiving our enemies? Perhaps we are not as bad as we think we are. If we are still struggling, we are still healthy. In making us, it seems God factored in human complexity, human weakness, and how growing into deeper love is a life-long journey. What can look like hypocrisy from the outside can in fact be a pilgrimage, a Camino walk, when seen within a fuller light of patience and understanding.

In Times Past ...

Hobart once had a 'live-wire Catholic Camera Club', a photographic society for photographical enthusiasts. Their subjects were generally not distinctly religious, as in mid-1950 when a competition 'called for photographs of boats or parts thereof', although surely an argument could be based on the breadth of creation and humanity's ongoing role in it.

As the Standard reported in June 1950, telling of a recent meeting, 'First prize went to Vincent Bowman. Second prize went to Vincent Bowman.' Third prize went to two people, one of whom was, by now unsurprisingly, Vincent Bowman. He was apparently very skilled. The winning shot was of 'a large oversea boat at the wharf and photographed by night'.

A rainy day meant that the club stayed indoors for that meeting, during which at least one group photo was taken in St Peter's Hall. Six men and three women mostly looked at the camera,



although one fellow was obviously distracted by something to the side. Their clothing, apart from revealing the period, also point to the cool weather outside.

One of the club members, 'Dickie', described a recent meeting in a letter to the Standard. 'We had a beaut demonstration of enlarging last meeting', he said. 'We saw just how this section of our processing could be easily performed. We also saw a few novel effects that can be obtained. We're all now awaiting the day we can bring our enlargers home for the first time.' But it was not all about technicalities and techniques. 'Dickie' mentioned that 'members were punhappy, and Joan Woodruff, our model, came in for much good humoured comment. It was funnier than any radio show there for a while.'

A following meeting focused on the cameras themselves, some of which were subjected to evident wordplay. There was a 'Baby Bessar', a 'Retinal', and one 'Big Bertha'. This time the competition was 'architectural', where Vincent



failed to score third or second place, but did manage to come out on top again for at least one more round.


