It is not just about migrants...

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Faith assures us that in a mysterious way the Kingdom of God is already present here on earth (cf. Gaudium et Spes, 39). Yet in our own time, we are saddened to see the obstacles and opposition it encounters. Violent conflicts and all-out wars continue to tear humanity apart; injustices and discrimination follow one upon the other; economic and social imbalances on a local or global scale prove difficult to overcome. And above all it is the poorest of the poor and the most disadvantaged who pay the price.

The most economically advanced societies are witnessing a growing trend towards extreme individualism which, combined with a utilitarian mentality and reinforced by the media, is producing a "globalization of indifference". In this scenario, migrants, refugees, displaced persons and victims of trafficking have become emblems of exclusion. In addition to the hardships that their condition entails, they are often looked down upon and considered the source of all society's ills. That attitude is an alarm bell warning of the moral decline we will face if we continue to give ground to the throw-away culture. In fact, if it continues, anyone who does not fall within the accepted norms of physical, mental and social well-being is at risk of marginalization and exclusion.

For this reason, the presence of migrants and refugees – and of vulnerable people in general – is an invitation to recover some of those essential dimensions of our Christian existence and our humanity that risk being overlooked in a prosperous society. That is why it is not just about migrants. When we show concern for them, we also show concern for

ourselves, for everyone; in taking care of them, we all grow; in listening to them, we also give voice to a part of ourselves that we may keep hidden because it is not well-regarded nowadays.

In a word, it is not only the cause of migrants that is at stake; it is not just about them, but about all of us, and



about the present and future of the human family. Migrants, especially those who are most vulnerable, help us to read the "signs of the times". Through them, the Lord is calling us to conversion, to be set free from exclusivity, indifference and the throw-away culture. Through them, the Lord invites us to embrace fully our Christian life and to contribute, each according to his or her proper vocation, to the building up of a world that is more and more in accord with God's plan. In expressing this prayerful hope, and through the intercession of the Virgin Mary, Our Lady of the Way, I invoke God's abundant blessings on all the world's migrants and refugees and upon on all those who accompany them on their journey.



In Times Past....

August 1957 was "Catholic Press Month", so Archbishop Guilford Young wrote a special message for an issue of the Standard devoted to that cause. "As Christians you desire truth and justice in journalism", he pointed out. The Archbishop also specifically mentioned "Communist persecution of Christians" abroad, which often went underreported in the secular press. Over page was a sizable report of conditions faced by the Church in China.

Taking up the theme, the Standard's editor pointed out that "Catholic Press Month is a time of severe self-examination in every office that produces a Catholic publication." It was, he maintained, a time for self-reflection rather than bombast. "The fundamental question is whether the publication is worthy of the Church it represents and the people for whom it is produced. There is no desire that Catholics should buy their papers only out of a sense of duty. Those papers should be worth buying. They should make their appeal on the basis of merit."

Similar ideas were reflected in an article by Auxiliary Bishop of Sydney James Freeman, who insisted the Church's messaging "must be clothed in the technical excellence of our times" and "truly modern in the best sense of that much abused word." His contribution was followed by a prayer, imploring God to "Inspire our editors with the encouraging thought of Thy divine trust reposed in them, and make them duly aware that unless they are men of prayer and piety, possessing prudence and intellectual honesty, their guidance may be in vain."

So while the masthead of the old Standard carried an image of a banner – emblazoned with the traditional message of Christian conquest dating from the days of the Roman Emperor Constantine – the paper's contributors seemed to acknowledge that their standards needed to be less militant, up to scratch, and always advancing.

In the event of an Emergency at St Mary's Cathedral or Sacred Heart Church the smooth operation of the Emergency Procedures can only by achieved if all parishioners, staff and volunteers are familiar with what is expected of them, otherwise panic could develop rapidly, resulting in chaos.

In the unlikely event of a fire or emergency in the Cathedral or Sacred Heart Church, please follow the instructions of the Chief Warden/Area Manager who will be wearing a coloured hard-hat. In most cases this will be the celebrating

priest, or a sacristan.

In the case of the Cathedral, if it is safe to do so, parishioners in the back half should exit via the rear glass doors and through the Harrington St doors. Parishioners towards the front of the Cathedral or in the transcepts should exit via the front Harrington St door or the sacristy doors and through outside to St Mary's College, if it is safe to do so. Once again, follow the instructions of the Warden. Do NOT return to seats or go looking for belongings. You must only take what is in your hands when the alarm goes off. If you are currently in the Cathedral Centre, do not use the lift. Call to everyone on your floor and assist any people if necessary to evacuate via the stairs and out through the front Centre doors. The designated gathering place for the Cathedral is in the car park, far from the Cathedral in Patrick St. The same applies for Sacred Heart Church; rear parishioners should exit via the doors above the College tennis courts. Forward parishioners should also exit via the same doors if it is safe to do so and not too crowded. If the Church is full the forward parishioners may exit via the sacristy. The gathering place is the quadrangle of the College as far from the Church as possible.

Even if you suspect it is a false alarm it is an offence to remain seated. Please ask someone for assistance to evacuate if necessary.

Please leave all driveways clear as the fire trucks will arrive and expect full access. This is why we ask that you do NOT park up alongside the Harrington St Cathedral doors or between St Virgil's College and the Cathedral in the small driveway. Also, please do not park right up against the Cathedral walls near the Mercy Door on the Patrick St side as these doors would need to be opened in an emergency.

If it is dark, please do not panic if the power is cut—this is purely an emergency precaution. If you have a torch on your phone feel free to use that but do NOT stand waiting to turn it on—simply proceed out in an orderly fashion.

Many members of the Cathedral Parish have been forwarded Emergency Evacuation Procedures so I once again ask that you familiarise yourselves with the document and come to the office to sign a register to record your awareness of the Procedures.

If you find you are alone in the building during an emergency, please proceed out the closest exit and ensure you call 000 even if the alarm is sounding.

Please ensure you always assist the elderly, infirm or vulnerable if safe to do so. Ensure doors are closed behind you to contain the fire. Do NOT wedge open the fire doors in the crypt or any other emergency stair door.

Ensure all heaters are turned off, candles extinguished and always report any suspicious behaviour to the office. Please do NOT let your children roam alone in the building nor ride up and down in the lift.

Saints of Italy Pilgrimage


