Vanity Vanity, All Is Vanity – Or Is It? Dear Brothers and Sisters,

The Preacher in our first reading today (Ecclesiastes 1:2, 2:21-23) points out how vain it is to strive for material possessions, when we all know that in the end we must leave them behind. Someone else, who has not laboured for them will inherit them. Theologians call them temporal goods – meaning that they are only for a time. This life is not like a game of Monopoly where whoever has the most property at the end wins.

In the Gospel today (Luke 12:13-21), Jesus face with Jesus our Lord and Saviour. And says the same thing to two brothers who are arguing about how to share their inheritance. He tells them a parable about a farmer who has a bumper harvest and dreams that his great wealth will give him ease and pleasure in his old age. He thinks he will build bigger barns to store all his wealth, and he will be set for life. God says to him "Fool! This very night the demand will be made for your soul; and this hoard of yours, whose will it be then?"

Brothers and sisters, we live in a very materialistic age and most of what we read, listen to or see in the media is all about acquiring personal wealth. And how we are attached to our stuff - our houses and too. cars, our toys and our money! But we are deluded to think that more wealth, or more possessions will make us happy and secure.

Today the Lord is challenging us to think seriously about how we are investing our efforts, our time and our money. Are we focused mostly on the things of this world, or as St Paul advises us, are we "looking for the things that are in heaven where Christ is sitting at God's right hand" (Colossians 3:1ff). That is certainly where we should be storing up treasure

for ourselves - in heaven where inflation won't erode it and where it won't rust or wear out. We would do well to spend whatever resources we have on doing good – helping the poor and especially helping those who are far from Him to find Jesus. That is the treasure we should be amassing – good works done in the power of Jesus' Name, by His grace and for His glory.

Because in the end this world, and all the goods of this world, will pass away. The day will come when we will be face-tothen the only thing that will matter is our relationship with Him. On that day we will need to render an account to Him of how we have responded to the amazing grace He has showered on us.

St Teresa of Avila had a favourite prayer. After her death it was found written on her bookmark:

Let nothing disturb you, let nothing frighten you.

All things are passing. God only is changeless. Patience gains all things. Whoever has God wants for nothing. God alone suffices.

Perhaps it should be our favourite prayer

The annual Mass honouring the Fatherhood of God will be held at St. Mary's Cathedral on Wednesday August 7th at 7pm. It will be preceded by a Holy Hour of Eucharistic Adoration and prayer starting at 6pm. After the Mass there will be an opportunity to have prayer for healing. In 1932 in a Church-approved message, reminiscent of His dialogue with St. Catherine of Siena, God the Father revealed to Mother Eugenia Ravasio, His desire to be "known, loved and honoured" especially through a liturgical feast. Pope Francis has recently called on Christians to have a closer relationship to our Heavenly Father: "For a Christian to pray is simply to say 'Abba' to say 'Papa', to say 'Dad' to say 'Father' but with the trust of a child." The absence of fathers in today's society has created "the father wound" - now recognised as the most universal wound on earth. As a result, God the Father has become an inadvertent stumbling block in people's spiritual developmentPope Francis reminds us that, as His children, God our Father loves us: "It is good to think that our God does not need sacrifices to win His favour! He does not need anything, our God: In prayer He asks only that we keep open a channel of communication with Him, to discover always that we are His beloved children. And He loves us so much......[to pray] it is enough to place ourselves under the gaze of God, to remember his Fatherly love." All are welcome to attend this special Mass as well as the Holy Hour. Working Too Hard – It Begins as Virtue and Ends as Escape By Fr Ron Rolheiser OMI

There are dangers in overwork, not matter how good the work and no matter how noble the motivation for doing it. Spiritual guides, beginning with Jesus, have always warned of the dangers of becoming too taken-up in our work. Many are the spouses in a marriage, many are the children in a family, many are the friends, and many are churches, who wish that someone they love and need more attention from was less busy.

But it is hard not to be over-busy and consumed by work, particularly during our generative years when the duties of raising children, paying mortgages, and running our churches and civic organizations falls more squarely on our shoulders. If you are a sensitive person you will wrestle constantly with the pressure to not surrender yourself to too many demands. As Henri Nouwen once described this, our lives often seem like over-packed suitcases with too much in them. There is always one more task to do, one more phone call to make, one more person to see, one more bill to pay, one more thing to check on the internet, one more leaky faucet to tend to, one more demand from some church or social agency, and one more item that needs to be picked up from the store. The demands never end and we are always conscious of some task that we still need to do. Our days are too short for all that needs to be done.

And so we give ourselves over to our work. It begins in good will and innocence but it invariably transmutes into something else. Initially we give ourselves over to all these demands because this is what is asked of us, but as more and more time goes by that commitment becomes less and less altruistic and more self-serving.

First off, though we are generally blind to this, our work soon becomes an escape. We remain busy and preoccupied enough that we have an inbuilt excuse and rationalization so as not to have to deal with relationships be that within our own families, our churches, or with God. Being weighed-down constantly with work and duty is a burden but it is also the

ultimate protection. We do not get to smell the flowers, but we do not have to deal either with the deeper things that lurk under the surface of they're interested, our lives. We can avoid the unresolved issues in our relationships and our psyches. We have the perfect excuse! We are too busy. Idleness may well be the devil's workshop, but busyness is not always a virtue.

Nobody is ever "too busy", if they'll make time.
