


In Times Past...

In May 1857 Bishop Willson was faced with a potential sectarian crisis. An inveterately anti-Catholic Protestant Minister announced his intention to deliver a lecture on "Worship of the Virgin Mary", misrepresenting and baiting Catholics all at once. It caused an least one prominent lay Catholic to announce he was cutting ties with the Temperance Society, which intended to host the lecture it its hall. Many other society members — Catholic and non-Catholic alike — agitated for the lecture to be cancelled.

Upon hearing of the proposed lecture Willson drafted a short but erudite account of the Church's teaching regarding Mary, explaining that she was not given the worship due to God. As a summary of what the Church thought and taught it remains fascinating. But it is his opening and closing statements that are perhaps of the most historical interest, for they reveal Willson's pragmatic approach to sectarian politics in colonial Tasmania. "The burning

brand of religious discord is a fearful instrument", he wrote, "and whoever presumes to hurl it, unprovoked, amidst a peaceful community, contracts a weight of responsibility which would make a wise and prudent man tremble."

Besides his beautiful prose, Willson offered a sensible message. He suggested that Catholics simply stay away from the proposed lecture. By going they would merely feed into its



purpose. "Be not a party to the introduction, in this Island," he advised, "of the spirit of religious strife and bitterness. And, moreover, scrupulously refrain from taking the least notice of what that person shall either say or print of the subject, either now, or at any other time." It remains good advice.

Having written this message, Willson had it printed and sold for a penny a copy. Underneath the advertised price was a message that spoke of Catholic charity and the good Bishop's wit: "The profit (if any) to be given to St. Mary's Hospital."

In Our Full Humanity by Fr Ron Rolheiser OMI

Several years ago, in church, I witnessed this incident: A young boy, perhaps six or seven years old, was growing restless and fidgety. Finally in a voice loud enough to be heard by those around him, he said to his mother: "I'm bored!" His mother, with a chiding little jerk to his arm, said sharply: "Michael, you're not bored!" Her response reminded me of what we hear, in essence, from many a liturgist, theologian, spiritual writer, teacher, or well-meaning parent at the dinner table. Reacting to the less-than-full-enthusiasm that he or she wants, the comment, spoken or unspoken, invariably is: "You're not bored! To be bored in this situation is wrong! You're supposed to be enthused and have your whole heart in this." For a long time, I felt guilty, precisely, about being bored in church, about sneaking an occasional glance at my watch during prayer, about thinking about my stomach and its hungers during a church service, about being distracted or falling asleep when trying to pray, about sometimes enjoying more the festive things around feasts like Christmas and Easter than the liturgical celebrations, about more-naturally gravitating towards this world and its pleasures than towards God and the other world, and about feeling less-than-fully enthusiastic sometimes for what should be the centre of my life, God, liturgy, prayer, service, fellowship in family and community. Daniel Berrigan once said: "Don't travel with anyone who expects you to be interesting all the time!" That's also true here: Don't listen to any liturgist, theologian, spiritual writer, teacher, community guru, or anyone else who expects you to be excited all the time. We get bored, get down, fidget, feel listless, and long for the distractions and pleasures of this life even when at church and it's healthy to be given permission not to feel guilty about it. We are, after all, human beings, not angels. What's needed to give us guidance for the spiritual journey is precisely anthropology, not angelology or some over-idealized, overly-spiritualized, or overly-romantic notion of humanity. Unlike angels or overly-idealized human beings we, real flesh and blood critters, get tired, get sick, get bored, get wounded, get over-anxious, fill regularly with sexual tension, and have to worry about our figure and our weight (not to mention debts and car payments). Unlike the angels, we have been asked to move towards God and each other in time and history and through a physical body and a soul that naturally and powerfully gravitate towards security, self-absorption, pleasure, personal achievement, and excitement.

I say this not as an excuse for mediocrity or lack of effort, but, as a protest for humanity so that we stop feeling guilty for being the way God made us. Simply put, given our God-given constitution, we will at times be bored in

church and pretty restless elsewhere and this doesn't mean that there's something wrong with us.
