The Weight of Our Glory in Christ

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

This Sunday and on through November, the Scripture readings in Mass draw our attention to the promise of eternal life which we have been given by Christ. The first reading (from 2 Maccabees 7) shines with the heroic faith of the Jewish martyrs concerning the resurrection of those who died obedient to God. They were quite willing to die rather than disobey God's law because they trusted that God would raise them up to glory afterwards.

The Gospel (from Luke 20) shows Jesus disputing with the Sadducees who did not believe in life after death. They based their belief on the fact that the resurrection of the dead is not explicitly mentioned in the Torah of Moses (the first five books of the Old Testament), which was the only Sacred Scripture that the Sadducees believed in. They also thought that the resurrection of the dead would present logical contradictions such as the one they pose to Jesus: to whom will remarried persons belong after the resurrection?

Jesus pointed out to them that they knew so little about the life to come. There will be no marriage or child rearing in Heaven because then there will be no more death. We, too, should remember that we cannot have much understanding of life

after death. We cannot grasp these things very clearly. At another time, Jesus told His followers: "I am the living bread that came down from heaven. Whoever eats of this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give for the life of the world is My flesh" (John 6:51). We have to take the promise of eternal life that Jesus has made to us on trust. We hope for things as yet unseen.



In trying to enlighten them about Heaven, Jesus told the Sadducees that after the resurrection we will be children of God and immortal like God and the angels. In fact, as the English Christian writer, C S Lewis, points out in his essay The Weight of Glory, we are already immortal. He wrote that there are no ordinary people. "You have never talked to a mere mortal. Nations, cultures, arts, civilisations these are mortal, and their life is to ours as the life of a gnat. But it is immortals whom we joke with, work with, marry, snub and exploit - immortal horrors or everlasting splendours. Next to the Blessed Sacrament itself, your neighbour is the holiest object presented to your senses. If he is your Christian neighbour, he is holy in almost the same way, for in him also Christ vere latitat - the glorifier and the glorified, Glory Himself, is truly hidden" (The Weight of Glory, William Collins, London, 2013, p.46).

It is good for us to think sometimes about the glory that Jesus promises we shall share with Him – that we, the Children of God, will see Him as He really is and will be like Him (1 John 3:2). The life we are leading now is nothing compared to the abundant and eternal life Jesus has in store for those who entrust themselves to Him, with Him and in Him. Deacon Nick MacFarlane

Attention Extraordinary Ministers of Communion Fr Shammi requests that all EMOCs should follow these guidelines as a refresher in carrying out this ministry effectively.

At the end of distribution, the special minister should reverently consume what consecrated wine remains in the chalice. Taking the purifier, this should be made into a pad, and the particles of the consecrated hosts remaining on the paten should be carefully brushed into the chalice. A small amount of water is then poured into the chalice, making sure that all particles are dissolved. The particles are then consumed. The chalice is then wiped out firmly inside the bowl, and around the rim. The purifier may then be placed in the chalice or folded lengthwise, and draped over the chalice.

In Times Past...

When it was performed by the Hobart Catholic Dramatic Club at the Theatre Royal in 1904, the Tasmanian News characterised "In the Trenches" as a "spectacular, stirring three-act military drama". Based on the Crimean War between Britain and Russia from a half-century earlier, it was very topical because Russia and Japan were at war that year. Characters included a Russian Countess, her daughter, her maid, one "Mrs Cleopatra Bull, who doesn't believe in judicial separation", a "Jonathan Bull, partner in roguery", "a Russian Serf", "An international financial agent", "Joe Cricket", and four men of military rank: a Colonel, a Lieutenant, a Sergeant, and a Private.

The Tasmanian News's theatre reporter briefly explained the plot: "The storming of the forts of Sebastopol is depicted by the actual storming of the forts by the British soldiers, and in which the battery replies with telling effect on British fire. The British, however, win the day, and the Russian flag is captured amid great excitement." A surviving advertising poster gives a more detailed synopsis. Act 1 began at Portsmouth and ends with the march to war, setting the scene for Britain's fight with Russia. Act 2

was "in the British Camp" and turned on "Spies in the Camp" before "THE BATTLE. STORMING THE FORTS OF SEBASTOPOL." Act 3 took place in that city, with a spot of "Russian Treachery" before the British victory was complete. With orchestral accompaniment, "thrilling incidents", and "bright uniforms", it was a decidedly patriotic affair.

But it was not quite so straightforward as these accounts make it seem, a fact well attested by the Mercury's much more detailed plot synopsis: "The play contains many romantic and stirring situations, all arising out of an English military officer marrying the Countess Woronzoff, a daughter of a noble Russian house, for which he is banished to Siberia; but he escapes, and again becomes a colonel in the British army. His wife, the Countess, however, has a son, who is brought up by a rich English gentleman, named Davenant, who adopts him. The countess comes with an adopted daughter to England, to look for her son, and they meet him at his home, but have no idea of the fact. Thinking he was the squire's son the countess's adopted daughter falls in love with him; but the squire wants him to marry a rich English heiress, and upon his refusal, casts him off. The countess, being told that he was a Russian serf, objects to him. Paul goes out to the Crimea, to fight for fame and fortune, and is successful. Then comes the denouement. The countess at last finds her husband and her son, and he, after all, gets her adopted daughter."

It was certainly complicated, but so was the Crimean War. At least the Catholic Dramatic Club reportedly made it very entertaining. **Dr Nick Brodie**


